TO COLLECT WAR DEBT.

Attorney-General Crawford Goes to Washington to Present Oregon's Bill.

Attorney-General Crawford left for Washington to present a petition to the United States court of claims asking for the refunding of the money voted by Oregon in 1864 to aid the government in carrying on the war. The claims amount to more than \$300,000, and were raised by bonded issue and by a special act of the state legislature in 1864. The bond issue was for \$138,000, and was later supplemented by an act appropriating \$100,000.

General Crawford was in Washington last winter and secured permission from congress to present Oregon's claims before the court of claims, and his trip this time will be for the purpose of presenting the final petition. The court will pass on the facts in the case and will present its findings before congress at a final hearing.

In speaking of his work before the court of claims, Attorney-General Crawford said:

"The money was raised by the state to secure soldiers to relieve the regulars in manning the forts along the coast. The act voting \$100,000 was passed for the purpose of increasing the pay of the soldiers. With the bond issue and the special act were popular at the time and were beneficial to the federal government at a period in the war when money was needed.

"The bond issue was quickly subscribed to by the people of Oregon, and the bonds were later redeemed with interest. It is only fair that the government should pay the state and I have every reason to believe it will. Men fit for military duty were scarce in 1864, and the money no doubt aided materially in securing helpful aid to the government.

"There are numerous other claims that the state will take up with the court of claims at this time and together with the interest on the money raised by the state will raise the total amount at issue to considerable over \$300,000. There is no doubt in my mind that the government will approve these claims and reimburse the state for the money given in a dark period of the war."

Mr. Crawford will be away about three weeks, and in addition to presenting the claims for debts will appear before the United States supreme court and present a motion asking permission to print the testimony for the purpose of determining the northern boundary of Oregon.

HAYWARD BACKS HIS MAN.

Says Dan Kelly Is Faster Than Snediar in the Hundred.

The controversy between the track critics of California and Oregon over the record made by Dan Kelly, the University of Oregon athlete, of 9.3-5 in the hundred yard dash, leads the Eugene Register to say:

Upon hearing the statements of Trainer Christie, of the University of California, in regard to a meet with Oregon, Trainer Hayward said last night, that he was more anxious to meet California and Snediar than Christie to meet Oregon and Kelly.

Hayward says that he gives credit to California's sprinter for what he is, a 10-second man; but that Kelly is a faster man. In any event Kelly would lose no more than the 100, and that with bad luck. Kelly, when Christie saw him run at the Lewis and Clark fair, Hayward says, ran like a "blind cow," but at a 10:1 clip. Kelly was only under a trainer last spring and this year and will be better than ever in all probability.

In case of a meet between the two schools, Hayward figures, that Oregon would get the most of the points in the weights, the sprints, hurdles and at least half in the jumps. In the distances Berkeley would have a little the best of Oregon, though with the new material in the freshman class, Oregon would be likely to get the quarter, and a good many other points in the half and mile. The weights may be cut down to the shot and hammer as in California the two mile race is run in preference to throwing the discus. That might benefit Oregon if the meet was pulled off in Eugene.

Hayward says that a field meet between the two institutions would almost of necessity have to come off in this state, for in the south school is out by the time the season is on in the northwest and the Californians would have to come here soon after examinations.

This afternoon Manager McCarty and President Campbell will discuss the matter of arranging the meet and soon after and something more definite may be learned.

Dan Kelly underwent an operation at Eugene last week and is now reported on his way to recovery. If Dan gets back into condition he will take part in the games to be held under the auspices of the Pacific Athletic association, at Berkeley, Cal., and as the Baker City aptly remarks, "Kelly will show them how to pick up their feet."

Lytle Accepts Right of Way.

E. E. Lytle, as president of the Pacific Railway & Navigation company, has accepted the agreement of the Tillamook business men for furnishing a right of way for the road from Tillamook City to where the survey crosses the Nehalem, and notices of acceptance have been forwarded. Right of way has already been secured for a considerable distance, and its stipulation in the agreement that \$10,000 will be set aside by the residents for the purchase of land through a timber tract of about 20 miles.

Orders have gone forth to organize a construction party to begin work on the coast, and 40 head of horses will be sent overland at once. Equipment will follow immediately, and work will be carried on during the winter. Steel and other heavy material will be transported by water.
