CEMENT CONTRACT POSTPONED

School Board Gives Prospective Bidders Another Week to Consider North Salem School Floor

The school board has continued the matter of awarding the contract for putting a cement floor in the basement of North Salem school house another week and will open bids and award the contract at a special meeting to be held next Saturday evening.

The Salem Board of Education has been put up against a hard problem. By the informal action of one of the board, Director Croisan, he ordered August Kehrberger to go ahead and put in a cement concrete floor in the North Salem school basement. The board had advertised for bids, but had taken no action as a board awarding the contract to anyone, and found some fault with Mr. Kehrberger's work, and refused to pay for the same.

Mr. Croisan explained that he was under the impression that he was one of the committee. The board took legal advice as the contract involves several hundred dollars, and find that they cannot legally issue a warrant to Mr. Kehrberger, besides condemning the manner in which the work was done.

The board was advised by its counsel to ask for new bids. Before so doing the board ordered Mr. Kehrberger to take out the concrete work he had put in. This he refused to do, but repaired the work at the places objected to, so as to make it conform to the demands of the board. In the meantime schools have opened and great inconvenience would be caused by putting in a new cement floor. Pressure has been brought to bear on some of the cement contractors so that they will not bid on doing the work, as a majority of the board want it done. At any rate the matter has been given a shaking-up, and it will result in putting an end to informal letting of contracts by single members of the board, as Mr. Croisan seemed to think he has a perfect right to do.

At the meeting last Saturday night, nothing but purely routine business was transacted. Epley, Smith and Lee were the only members present. Dr. Byrd was called away on professional work and Director Croisan was conspicuous by his absence. Clerk Johnson and Professor Powers were at the meeting.
