Brunswick Foxhound Club Trails.

Boston, Oct. 9.—The Brunswick Foxhound club is holding its annual field trials today at Barre, where there is the largest turnout in the history of the club. The first prize-winners in the hunting, trailing, speed and driving, endurance and tongueing classes, each won outright a silver cup. The hound making the highest general average won a silver cup, and will hold for one year the Hitchcock championship cup and the Woodstock Kennel cup. The latter cup will become the property of the club member winning in twice, but the wins need not be made in successive years nor with the same hound.

A "Bomb" Attempt.

Kazan, Russia, Oct. 8.—Two bombs slightly injured Vice-Governor Kobeto today. His assailant escaped.

Supreme Court Meets.

Washington, Oct. 8.—Justice of the supreme court Brown's resignation, causing a vacancy in the court, met at noon today in a brief, formal session and adjourned to pay its respects to the President. Real work will begin tomorrow. The first case will be the state of Kansas against Colorado, involving the irrigation rights on the Arkansas river.

Mr. Wilkins graduated at Willamette University with the class of 1903 and has held pastorates at Cornelius and North Yamhill. Mrs. Wilkins, formerly Miss Louise Van Wagner, was a resident of this city.

Irving Opens His American Tour.

New York, Oct. 9.—Henry H. Irving, the young English actor, son of the late Sir Henry Irving, opened his American tour last night at the New Amsterdam theater in Stephen Phillips' "Paul and Francesca." He is supported by Dorothy Baird and an English company.

Attorney General A. M. Crawford left Sunday for Portland, whence he will go to Washington, D. C., to present the case of Oregon in the inter-state boundary controversy with Washington.

Golden Jubilee of Methodist Church.

Covington, Ky., Oct. 9.—The golden jubilee and fiftieth anniversary of the Immanuel M. E. church of this city is being celebrated. Fifty years ago a few worshippers of the Methodist doctrine organized themselves into a body and worshipped at a small frame dwelling on the site where the present magnificent edifice now stands. They were few in number at that time but have gained strength in these fifty years, until now they rank among the strongest congregations of Kentucky. Rev. C. E. Miller, former pastor and now presiding elder over the Louisville district, preached the anniversary sermon.

Gun Club Has Tournney.

Yazoo City, Miss., Oct. 9.—The Yazoo gun club has a tournament in progress, which it will continue until the 10th. Crack shots are here from all sections of the state, and the competition has been brisk. Antiquated weapons have been exhibited exciting much interest. The contrast between them and modern weapons being marked in the extreme. There is also a fine collection of mounted game birds.

Hughes Starts Up the State.

New York, Oct. 8.—Charles F. Hughes, candidate of the Republicans for governor of the Empire state, started on his stumping tour of the state Monday, and will keep it up until the election. He will speak in the principal cities, and has already spoken in New York city, and in Brooklyn. Hughes is an incisive public speaker, and makes a strong impression on his audiences.
