VELGUTH WEARING STRIPES

Separated from Nadine and Playing Checkers With His Nose

Bernard Oscar Velguth, the young tailor-made automobile sport, whose pecculations caused consternation in the Portland Gas Company's office, and whose subsequent marriage to the fair San Francisco divorcee, Nadine Nicholl, added somewhat to the safety of nations, has donned prison stripes at the state penitentiary. He arrived at the James boarding house last evening chaperoned by Sheriff Bob Stevens, of Multnomah county, and will spend some time at the institution, depending on circumstances.

The last acts in the Velguth scandal were as meteoric and melodramatic as the former ones. Yesterday afternoon Velguth appeared in the circuit court at Portland and pleaded guilty to the charge of embezzlement, and was given an indeterminate term in the penitentiary of from one to ten years. Under the law, if his conduct has been good, he may be pardoned or paroled at the end of a year; otherwise he may be kept in prison for ten years. He was accompanied to the prison by his brother, Arthur Velguth.

Velguth was a clerk for the Portland Gas Company, and on a salary of \$80 per month, lived the pace that kills, and is said to have stolen \$20,000 from the company. He is believed to have squandered a large portion of this sum on his enchantress, Mrs. Nadine Nicholl, whom he married directly after his arrest.

Hop Grower's Opinion.

Ed. C. Herren, the well-known hop grower and merchant, of Aurora, returned home this morning, after a brief visit in the city. He reports the hop market very quiet, and, in his opinion, it is likely to remain so for awhile longer at least. The fact that something like 60,000 bales of hops have been contracted here in Oregon, and that it will take about four months for that amount to be used by the brewers, leads him to believe that the market will be dull for a time. "At Aurora the hops this year," said he, "were of fine quality and the crop in the entire neighborhood was free from mould. The picking season was all over by the 16th."

As to the prosperity of the little town of Aurora, he reports considerable increase in building, and that

there has been an influx of new residents during the past year. "All of our people have money in the bank, and others have it tucked away in an oyster can in some secluded spot," he added with a broad smile.

Verdict for Plaintiff.

The case of Schlickelser against Fred Dose, an appeal from the justice court of Hubbard, occupied most of the time yesterday in Judge Burnett's court. It appeared that last April Fred Dose, of Woodburn, contracted, at Wilsonville, for something like 200 sacks of potatoes, valued at \$211, from C. L. Schlickelser and A. Peters. The defense contended that the contract was not in writing, as to Mr. Peters' part, and that the contract was only for 100 sacks with the plaintiff, and that there was no delivery of the same because of warehouse charges. The jury, after being out a little while, brought in a verdict for the plaintiff for the amount sued for, \$211.90.

H. Overton represented Fred Dose and Dimick & Dimick, of Oregon City, and S. T. Richardson appeared for the plaintiff.

Bustrin Indicted for Murder.

The grand jury that had charge of investigating the tragedy which took place at St. Paul September 2d, when Marshal Joe Krechter was killed, returned two indictments yesterday at 5 o'clock. Fred Bustrin is charged with murder in the first degree; while Warren Eastman, James G. Seeley, William Murphy and Wm. Murphy and Fred Bustrin are charged with the crime of riot. All the defendants appeared in court. Bustrin, who has been suffering from wounds received during the encounter, was very weak, and had to be assisted to reach the court room. He was returned to jail, as bail cannot be given for murder in the first degree. The bond of Wm. Murphy, the owner of the saloon in which the tragedy took place, was raised from \$250 to \$1500, August Huckestein and R. A. Kirk, of this city, being sureties.

Attorney Dan R. Murphy, brother of Wm. Murphy, and Web Holmes have been retained as counsel by the defendants.
