### GIG GUN WEDS

#### Emperor Guards Fraulein Krupp Fearing She Will Be Assassinated

Essen, Germany, Oct. 13.—Fear of the assassination of Fraulein Krupp before her marriage to Lieutenant Von Hohlen Monday, the emperor is guarding the Krupp mansion as carefully as his own palace. The bride will present a quarter of a million dollars to the pension fund for the Kruppe works.

Essen, Oct. 13.—Although the religious ceremony of the marriage of Fraulein Krupp to Von Hohlen is set for Monday, the civil ceremony was performed today. The couple are now really married, the civil ceremony being legally binding.

#### The Pope Is Well.

### TROOPS ON THE BORDER

#### Mexico Sends 2,000 Soldiers to Overawe the Incipient Revolution

Laredo, Texas, Oct. 13.—Two thousand Mexican troops have been sent to the border near Rio Grande City, where two leaders of the revolutionists have been arrested by American officials. It is thought there are many other rebels in the vicinity. A representative of the Mexican government is present at the trial now in progress.

### RAILWAY CLERKS STRIKE

El Paso, Tex., Oct. 13.—Every member of the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks of the Atlantic system and the Southern Pacific, from El Paso to New Orleans, is on a strike this morning. The clerks ask 10 per cent increase in wages, and pay for overtime, and recognition of the order.

### THUGS MUST LEAVE

#### San Francisco Organizes Committee of Safety to Aid Police

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—A preliminary great mass meeting of the citizens was held this afternoon to form a committee of public safety. The committee on chairman met this morning to select a chairman, whose duty it would be to name a committee of 100. The plan in general was also informally discussed, and Mayor Gallagher's position considered, he having declared that he would not permit the committee on safety to usurp police powers. There seems to be a division of sentiment among the leaders of the movement; some advocating vigorous measures, which some affect to believe means lynching the thugs when caught; while others stand for coalition with the police. It can be safely predicted, however the latter plan will win, as only a very small minority favor a vigilant organization such as ruled and cleaned up the city in the days of the gold excitement. The determination of the committee on safety to investigate the alleged collusion of police with the thugs is unshaken, and it is claimed that evidence in proof of this has already been secured. The protection of resorts frequented by crooks is also being looked into. Offers of financial support in the movement to rid the city of thugs are coming from many parts of the state, Fresno, Eureka, Sacramento, San Jose and Santa Cruz already having been heard from.

### LEAPS FROM TRACK

#### One Killed, Four Badly Mangled and Fifteen Others Injured

Los Angeles, Oct. 13.—A Brooklyn avenue car ran away on a steep curve this morning, on account of the brakes failing to work, jumped the track and overturned, killing W. A. Bennett underneath it. It injured over a score of the 60 passengers on board.

The car was racing madly along, and when it reached the curve it took the first curve, but at the reverse it flew the track and overturned. H. C. Bowders, the motor man, staid at his post, but passengers hanging onto the car jumped. Barrett was killed outright, C. A. Cattlett, badly bruised and crushed; N. H. Freitage, right leg crushed so badly that amputation will be necessary; Mary Murray, chest crushed and head bruised producing concussion of the brain; Mrs. Lillie Breade, crushed, and at least 15 others hurt, but not so seriously.

### BRAINED WITH AN AXE

#### Insane Farmer Kills Wife and Six Children Then Commits Suicide

Newport, Tenn., Oct. 13.—Chalburn Mintooh, aged 57, and one of the most prominent farmers in this neighborhood, today murdered his wife and four children, fatally injured two other children and committed suicide by cutting his throat. All the evidence shows Mintooh went suddenly insane. The murders were committed with an ax, he training his wife and children.
