WATER RIGHTS SECURED

Santiam River and Marion Lake Are Now Both Appropriated

An Albany dispatch Sunday says: Walter Mackay has filed with the county recorder two notices of location of water rights in Linn and Marion counties, aggregating 42,000 horsepower. He states in his filing that the purpose is to generate electric power for use in the Willamette valley for the operation of electric roads and municipal light plants, and that he will build an immense reservoir at Marion Lake, just across the line in Marion county, and near the summit of the Cascade mountains. A flume or ditch 12 feet wide will be constructed and the waters of Marion fork of the North Santiam will be used and a dam constructed with penstocks, and the water of Marion Lake itself appropriated.

This is one of the most beautiful bodies of water in Oregon, an immense pond of pure water one mile wide and three miles long. It is of varying depth, bottom never having been reached in some places.

For years Marion Lake has been the resort of campers and fishermen. It is on the line of the right of way of the Corvallis & Eastern railroad, and this new appropriation of water rights for the avowed purpose of generating electric power for the operation of electric railroads has given rise to speculation as to whether Mackay is not representing people interested in the extension of the Corvallis & Eastern, and paving the way for the use of electric power on the road. From the water rights filed on, enough power could be generated to furnish the entire valley with electricity.

About a mile below the outlet of the lake, on the Marion fork of the North Santiam river, there is a fall of 80 or 100 feet, and the filing includes this fall.

High School Football.

At the high school, football enthusiasm is in the air and the prospects for a good team are becoming more and more pronounced. The candidates for the first team are reporting each evening for practice and Manager Mott is much pleased at the interest shown.

Saturday a communication was received from the management of the Columbia University team asking for a game for October 27 to be

played in Salem. It is not thought that the offer will be accepted as Columbia University's team is not in the high school class and it is asserted the local team wishes to play games with high school only. Other games have been arranged as follows: Eugene high school, at Eugene, October 29; Portland high school, at Portland, November 2, but as to the schedule with the Pendleton high and Baker City high schools nothing definite has as yet been agreed upon. A second team will also be formed and games will be played with the deaf mutes, Woodburn, reform school and other aggregations.

A Negro on the Race Problem.

The New York World recently printed the following letter from a negro, who "evidently understands the situation:

While I regret that there were a lot of innocent men of my race killed in the recent riot at Atlanta, Ga., for the sake of a few low, degraded men who have been attempting rape upon white women, I am also sorry that the younger people of my race have been acting so much like brutes of late around Atlanta and vicinity, for it is understood that whenever they commit a crime like that nothing short of death will be the penalty.

The race problem must first be solved among ourselves. The trouble of the negro race of this country is, whenever they get a little education and a little money they want to mix with the white people, and leave the uneducated and poor negro behind. Ever since the President had Booker T. Washington to call on him at Washington, and supposed to have dined with him, the majority of the negroes of the South have gone crazy over the action, and they think that the white people of the North wish social equality with them, but if any negro man or white man says that the President believes in social equality he lies.

The President does not believe in a white man marrying a negro wo-

man, nor a negro man marrying a white woman, but in seeking employment he does believe in them having just as much right there, and after that they should go no further in social equality lines. Instead of the young negroes around Atlanta going out and hunting work (some of them won't even polish a shoe or brush a gentleman off, they are that lazy), they love to lay around and have some lady feed them from the white people's kitchens. That's what is ruining our race all over the country.

Instead of the negroes bothering with politics they have other things to learn. The first thing for the negro of this country to learn is manners, and to behave, and to keep himself and herself in their place; and the next thing for the negro women to do is to learn how to respect the men of our race. And in the future I hope the negroes around Atlanta will act more human-like than they have been acting in the past.
