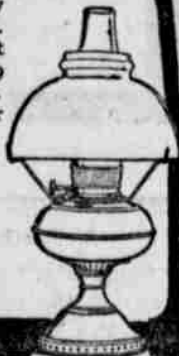

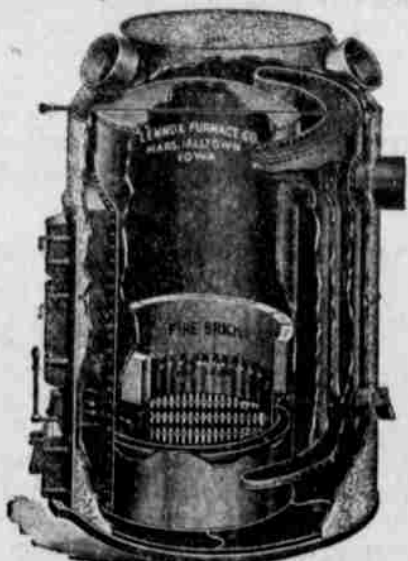

## NEVADA'S GREAT MINING CAMP

Hon. Walter Moore, of Baker City, writes from Goldfield, Nevada, to the Baker City Democrat as follows:

Goldfields, Nev., Sept. 30.—According to promise I send you a brief summary of this camp (also for the information of my friends. Goldfield is the magic word in Nevada and also in the mining world. It is situated in Esmeralda county nearly 280 miles south of Reno and 28 miles due south of Tonopah. The elevation is a trifle over 5700 feet or some 100 feet higher than Tonopah according to the measurements of the government. The camp lies in a huge basin surrounded by lava capped hills. There is no vegetation of any description except a few palms, which the prospectors call "Joshuas." They are a cactus of different heights from four to eight feet with a straight stem and a head like a cocoa nut, surrounded with leaves like a bayonet. This is the only kind of vegetation in Goldfield. The soil is fine sand and gravel. All the colors of the rainbow are depicted in the formation of the hills from a glistening white to a deep crimson red. The city itself contains a population of some 15,000 besides a floating contingent of some three or four thousand that come and go. Each train is crowded both ways and there are two passenger trains a day. The railroads by Divine right own this earth and the people. The depot is located a mile from the city which gives the hacks and express people a chance to exact 50 cents for a package and 50 cents a fare for passengers each way and there is no escape. The Tonopah railroad is one main street and such a street can not be paralleled in any other city on the face of the earth. Every known description of commerce, immorality and vice is located upon it from the school house and church to dens of infamy. The mines are strictly in the city. Thousands of tents dot their surface. In fact a furnished house in Goldfield consists of a tent with board flooring, a door in front and a sheet-iron stove. Rents are high. Business houses renting from \$350 up to \$700 per month and none for rent as business is humming in every line. An evening in Goldfield will not be forgotten for a long time. Thousands of people jostle each other and elbow their way along the street which is crowded with a surging, restless mob of humanity from all parts of the earth. I noticed in a distance of three hundred yards three different gangs of orators with immense crowds listening. One was a negro socialist with a banjo for an orchestra, was shouting for socialism, showing the whites of his eyes and his glistening teeth of the Goulds, Carnegies and other millionaires to the admiration of his audience. Next to him was a temperance orator who was giving the "rum fiend" the scrap of his life. The next was the Salvation army, composed of four Swedish ladies, a huge drum, a small organ and a guitar. The two elderly ladies, the captain and the major were screeching the number of years they had fought satan when an old prospector stepped to the front and tried his hand at the Highland fling. This brought down the crowd and elated the prospector who was preparing to respond to an encore when the drum major pounced on the prospector, pinned him by the neck and paraded him before the crowd as one of satan's oldest boys full of rum and deviltry. The crowd yelled its approval. A few rods away was a dance and gambling hall simply crowded to suffocation, and such reckless gambling; such piles of shining gold and silver. The limit here is \$12.50 to \$50 but there is really no limit in the games. We saw Diamondfield Jack lose \$5000 in gold in twenty minutes on craps. Strange as it may seem, not a woman is seen or allowed inside of these halls except the Salvation army women for the purpose of taking up their collections. I have seen Diamondfield Jack on the train between two heavily armed guards and wearing an "Oregon Boot" on one leg going to the penitentiary to be hung, yet there was the same Jack Davis, tossing gold across the table by the handful.

The mines here are rich beyond description and are working for all there is in them. The Mohawk alone operates seventeen hoisting works. Eleven of the mines are shipping ore that is very rich, running from \$200 to \$500 to the ton. The mines have very few buildings. The hoists are all run with gasoline engines and are very primitive. The railroad has so many spurs that it looks

like a huge spider web, the branches or spurs running to the different mines in the district. This is no place for a prospector. The ground is taken for 50 miles in all directions and no fractions left. The days of the burro have passed away and the automobile does the work. In locating here, a gang of men go out together and soon a strike is heard of.

Water is very scarce and many a man has left his bones to glisten in the sun rays of this sandy desert. The entire country here is simply a limitless stretch of glittering sand and to try to travel here without your water "barl" or canteen simply means death.

Regarding the labor market in Goldfields it is simply full to overflowing and thousands of men come here only to be disappointed. The Union rules things absolutely. Not a tap is done in any shape or form except with the sanction of the Union from a boy that sells papers to the boss. I send a few prices: hay \$10, coal \$18.50, wood \$14.50, potatoes 7 pounds for 25 cents, eggs 60 cents per dozen, flour \$2.75 a sack, water 5 cents a bucket full, meals 50 cents, lodging 50 cents to \$2 per night, meat 10 to 30 cents pound, vegetables 5 cents a pound, etc.

The climate here is good, as far as I can see, except the sand storms and the imps in hades armed with scoop shovels could not raise the dust a Nevada sand storm does. I would warn all prospectors against coming here and especially those of small means. If you have means, a cool head, are strong and determined this is the place for you if you are looking for gold as it is the richest country on the face of the earth.
