MOUNT HOOD IS ECLIPSED

Engineer Berry Discovers Wallowa Peak Higher Than Oregon's Snow Capped Wonder

Perhaps after all, Mt. Hood is not the highest peak in Oregon. T. R. Berry, engineer for the Grande Ronde Water company says it is not. He has been up in the wilds of Wallowa county and has made observations and calculations that he claims show that "Eagle Chief" a peak in the Eagle range near the headwaters of the Imnaha river, is several hundred feet higher than Hood. The peak is in one of the most beautiful and picturesque parts of the country and is in Wallowa county, the last home of Joseph and the Nez Perces.

Mr. Berry's investigations were strictly scientific, caused by his interest in nature and were only incidental to his work for the irrigation company. He took the elevations from the nearest government altitude corners or station by aneroid but owing to his accident did not have time to verify his measurements which he will do when the snow goes off in the spring. His preliminary surveys and measurements show that this peak of the Eagle range of mountains, which has been named "Eagle chief," is several hundred feet higher than Mt. Hood, the tallest hill of Oregon and one of the highest mountains on the Pacific slope. This makes a new record for distances upward in Oregon and Baker county will now carry the high banner.

"Eagle Chief" lies between Imnaha and the head of Minum river in a straight line 45 miles northeast of Baker City. It is snow capped the year round and is the center of such wild scenes of beauty nature never dreamed of painting in Switzerland, or Italy. This monarch of the hills with his head in the clouds and his feet planted in fir covered hills is surrounded with a chain of the most beautiful lakes that ever reflected an Oregon sky.

Mr. Berry had with him an expert photographer who for the first time took photographs of these magnificent scenes from nature. Doubtless he will have them reproduced for the benefit of pleasure seekers and sportsmen. Fish and game abound in this paradise as yet an almost unexplored country.
