The Play, a Splendid One
the Scenery and
Majestic

"The Convict's Daughter," which will be the attraction at the Grand opera house Monday evening, Oct. 22, is said to be one of the best presented comedy dramas offered to the theatre going public, while in incident and theme it is most powerful, every climax breaking with almost volcanic intensity. So much, by way of introduction: To go into the play itself, nothing can be said to detract from its worth. In the entire company, from the actor who



interprets the leading role down to the mere stage loiterers, there is not one single person who has been negligently selected or unintelligently cast. This comedy drama, which lacks all the melodramatic thunder of bygone days, is new and unknown, but cannot remain so, for its magnificent staging at once becomes its herald and sounds its own alarm. Nothing has been sacrificed to appearance for there is brought together a series of incidents that hold the interest as had nothing that that has come before it. The situations, the motives, the characters commingle without the least jarring or tugging or straining, giving a pleasant finesse to a story that is said to be taken from life. The climaxes develop quickly and break magnificently, while the lighter moments are as rolling as a Sousa march, the sentimental fragments being truly natural and the comedy bits as sparkling as the lights which adorn the stage.

ORDER OUT OF CHAOS

The Great College at Stanford
Recovers Rapidly From
Its Shaking

Stanford University, Cal., Oct. 17. Ed. Journal: Those who are interested in Stanford university will be glad to learn that it has as good an attendance this year as ever before. The dormitories, Roble and Encina Halls, the buildings that withstood the earthquake shock so well, are completely occupied, except a few rooms which are being repaired. These rooms are spoken for when completed.

Many predicted last spring that the attendance of the young ladies would decrease considerably in the fall. This, however, is not the case, they have returned as usual, showing that they are no more afraid of a little earthquake than the boys.

The big stone chimney, which all Stanford men knew so well, has been replaced by a steel one. The arch is being torn down, and a better one will be erected in its place. Around the new gymnasium and library there is a small army of men at work re-cutting the blocks of stone, which have to be taken down. These blocks are piled up until they look like small pyramids. Men and boys are cleaning the old brick, and, judging from the rapidly increasing piles, a person would think they were in the midst of a large brick yard. Reconstruction work is going on as fast as possible wherever necessary. The recitation and engineering buildings are in use the same as ever. The church has been roofed over, and the report is that it will be rebuilt as before. The chemistry building has been temporarily repaired, but the museum is not yet open to the public.

At present Rugby football is claiming attention. The game between the freshmen classes of Stanford and Berkeley has been played, but it did not seem to bring out the enthusiasm inspired by the "old game." There is much speculation as to whether it will arouse sufficient interest and possesses the requisite advantages over the American game to become a permanent college sport.

The "Stanford spirit," which is becoming famous, is stronger this year than ever. R
