The Crapsey Heresy Case Appeal.

Buffalo, Oct. 19.—After an adjournment from September 5th the Crapsey Heresy case which has been agitating the diocese of western New York for a considerable time past, was continued here today. The Rev. Dr. Algernon S. Crapsey, of Rochester, N. Y., having been found guilty of heretical practices appealed from the decision on the ground that the court which condemned him was illegally formed. Bishop Scarborough, of Trenton, N. J., presided at the court today and the others constituting the court are Rev. Dr. W. Huntington, of New York; the Rev. Dr. A. B. Baker, of New Jersey; Rev. Dr. J. G. Moses, of Garden City; L. L. Frederick Adams, of Newark; Jas. Parker, of New Jersey, and Charles Andrews, of the diocese of central New York. In the original trial the court on convicting Dr. Crapsey suspended him from exercising the functions of a minister "until such time as he shall satisfy the ecclesiastical authority of the diocese that his belief and teaching conform to the doctrines of the apostles' creed and the Nicene creed, as this church hath received the same." Mr. H. Shephard and Congressman J. P. Perkins of Rochester, appear as counsel for Dr. Crapsey, and John Lard O'Brien as church advocate representing the standing committee which brought the charges. Many friends of Dr. Crapsey and a number of parishioners were present. At present there is no higher court to which an appeal could be taken from the decision of the court of review although there is a movement in the church to create one in order that the ecclesiastical system may conform more to the civil judiciary system. Dr. Crapsey stated at the last hearing that the Episcopal Church of the Constitution and its founders had patterned it more on the lines of the articles of confederation which accounted for the present system. The case will occupy at least three days.

Demand for Land in Texas.

Austin, Oct. 19.—There are on file today in Land Commissioner Terrell's office 13,500 applications for land in Texas which have to be disposed of. According to the commissioner there has never been such a demand for state land and public domain as is now prevailing. Numbers of applications are from the north and northeast. There are on file some 3000 applications for the purchase of state lands in El Paso county alone and while the great bulk of the prospective purchasers want lands situated in the eight-section territory many are after lands in other sections of the state. Under the law a purchaser can buy eight sections at a time. While most of the purchasers want this land for grazing purposes to make ranches, having been driven from other portions of the state on account of the great advance in the price of lands, quite a number of those who are buying intend to utilize the lands to develop the minerals found on them. Up to the present 7,000,000 acres have been sold while there are yet over 16,000,000 acres of state lands for disposal in Texas. Lamar county, north of the Red river, is a belt of red alluvial soil unequal in fertility and adapted for the raising of corn, cotton, and fruit. Arthur City is a small town 15 miles north of Paris, where some of the finest land in the state can be purchased. Unimproved land ranges in value from \$6 to \$15 and improved from \$15 to \$25. The timber embraces all varieties of oak and ash with elm, gums and hickory, pecan bois d'arc, sycamore and cottonwood. The upland is very fertile but the country is very thinly populated.

Trade School for Georgia.

Columbus, Oct. 19.—The Secondary Industrial school founded by the merchants of Columbia led by G. Gundy Jordan, president of the Eagle and Cotton mills, which is rapidly approaching completion makes a distinct departure in the field of education. The schools will be devoted entirely to the study of cotton mill machinery, and all matters in connection with the cotton industry and it is expected that pupils after a few years training will take places in the breakers room, card room, spinning room and dye house and receive wages higher than what their fathers are now drawing. On the 1st of January when the child labor legislation comes into force in this state, children under 14 years cannot be employed in cotton mills but now the new school will be opened and an immense amount of good done in the district.

Peggy Stewart Day

Annapolis, Oct. 19.—Perry Stewart's day commemorates the burning in the harbor here on October 19, 1774, just before the outbreak of the revolutionary war, of the brig Peggy Stewart, which had brought into the port a ton of tea, the plant so detested at that time by every patriotic colonist. The vessel was named after the handsome daughter of its owner, Anthony Stewart, a Scotch merchant. Referring to the action taken by the patriots when the vessel arrived with its obnoxious cargo the Baltimore Patriot of January 29, 1813 says: "When the party first entered the city and was passing on they met Stewart who was bold in opposition. But his threats only served to increase their determination. They erected a gallows directly before his house, by way of intimidation, then gave him his choice either to swing by the halter or to go with them on board and put fire to his own vessel. He chose the latter and in a few minutes the whole cargo, with ships tackle and apparel was in flames. This act decided the course. Maryland had to pursue and had an extensive influence upon public opinion." McMahon in his history of Maryland says: "The tea burning in Boston has acquired renown, as an act of unexampled daring at that day in the defense of American liberty. But the tea burning at Annapolis, which occurred in the ensuing fall, far surpasses it in the apparent deliberation and utter carelessness of concealment attending the bold measure which led to its accomplishment. The insistence, in its manifestation of public feeling, is of a character with those which occurred in other parts of the province, and they even the prevalence throughout of the most determined and restless opposition to the measures of the British government."

Lafayette Monument Dedicated.

Paris, Oct. 19.—Today being the anniversary of the surrender and fall of Yorktown the monument to Lafayette erected in Paris was dedicated, the ceremonies being attended by a large number of Americans resident here. The monument was subscribed for and presented by the Lafayette memorial commission of which Robert J. Thompson, of Chicago, is secretary and a special fund was built for it in Providence, R. I., where it was cast in bronze. The preliminary dedication took place in Paris, July 4, 1900, at which time the monument was erected in temporary form but it became so weather beaten and presented so unattractive an appearance that no little criticism has been evoked in the United States about it.

The Raffle Palm.

London, Oct. 19.—Mr. Wm. H. Hunt, the American consul at Tamatave, Madagascar, announces that he has made an important discovery in the leaves of the raffle plant. He states that he has found a substance which by its chemical and physical properties, may be classed between wax and gum and bids fair to become a valuable commodity in that country. The process of extracting the wax is very simple. The natives gather the raffle fibre and the leaves, which are thrown aside in quantities are beaten on a dry mat or cloth. The pellicles and white powder which fall from them are gathered and boiled and wax thus formed. Owing to its consistency it can be used for various purposes such as gramophone cylinders, etc.

Missouri Immigration Association.

Blomark, Oct. 19.—The first annual show of fruit, dairy products and poultry was held by the Missouri Immigration association here today and was a complete success. Prof. E. H. Webster, chief of the dairy division, national agricultural department was present and expressed himself highly pleased with all the exhibits. The directors believing that eastern Ozarks has not kept pace with other sections of the state where land, water, seasons, crops and other conditions with the success of the undertaking that the future is to be made an annual one.

THE COTTON CODE.

Supreme Court Decision Said to Lift the Rate Law.

It has been ascertained that omission of the law prohibiting discrimination by railroads in the matter of long and short hauls may possibly be accounted for by a supreme court decision. This decision is recorded in the 22d Oregon, and is on a suit brought by the Southern Pacific, when an opinion was written by Judge Bean says that the section in question was repealed by implication by the law passed in 1891.
