Political Crises in Spain.

Madrid, Oct. 20.—During the session of the Cortes which opened today the vatican and the liberal government of Marshall Lopez Dominguez are to cross swords with each other. While the actual separation of church and state in Spain, the stronghold of Catholicism, is not to be immediately raised, as in France the program of the liberalists is distinctly anti-clerical, and if it is successful is sure ultimately to lead to an open fight for the severance of the ties which bind the vatican and the Bourbon dynasty. Meanwhile the political world is much interested as to whether the vatican merely wishes to fight for the re-establishment of its prerogatives, which it has permitted to fill more or less into abeyance, or if it has a deeper plan to precipitate the downfall of the liberal cabinet and the return of the reactionary party. Trouble is also brewing in another quarter. According to prominent members of the opposition there is great danger of the extension of the present Carlist agitation in spite of the governments declaration attaching no importance to the movement. It is declared that numerous guerrilla bands are concentrating and that the inhabitant of Navarre province are greatly excited. It is expected that the Catalanists and the republicans will make common cause with the Carlists and it is reported that the elites are supplying the movement with funds to embarrass the government. It was in consequence of this that the proposed manoeuvres in the vicinity of Barcelona were postponed.

Ogden Gateway Closed.

Ogden Utah, Oct. 20.—Though the Ogden Gate has for a long time stood ajar the inevitable has happened it will now be closed, and the Rio Grande, and Gould lines, will be shut out of Idaho and Montana absolutely by the Oregon Short Line. When the announcement was recently made that the Denver and Rio Grande would not be represented in the Idaho and Montana tariff sheets that are issued by the Harriman lines it plainly meant the closing of the Ogden gateway consequently the Union Pacific will get the long haul from Denver to the northwest. All connecting lines at Denver have taken advantage of the new tariff, consequently all freight will be directed from the Denver and Rio Grande because no person will pay

the local rate on freight west and north of Ogden, the terminus of the Rio Grande. The agencies of the doomed lines at Butte and Portland, Ore., are closed. The closing of the Ogden gateway means that the Rio Grande will be shut out of Cache valley, Brigham City, Pocatello and all other points north and west of Ogden. Naturally merchants will not ship their goods from the east over the Rio Grande and then pay the local rate on from Ogden in addition. In consequence all the business will go to the Harriman lines until the Western Pacific and Goulds projection line to Idaho and Portland are built. Then there will be another merry scramble.

Philippine Friar Land.

Washington, Oct. 20.—Today the treasury ordered payment of \$3,521,000 through the International Banking company of New York, to the Philippine Sugar Estates Development company, in final payment of the lands. This payment will include the Dominion Friar land purchase about which a question of title arose. The Dominion land included about 150,000 acres, and the title dispute having arisen, the government served notice on the Development company, which claimed ownership, that no money will be paid until an absolutely clear title was furnished. This having been done payment was ordered.

Auto Races at Yonkers.

New York, Oct. 20.—With the automobile racing fever at nearly white heat the tenth annual meeting of the Empire City club was held in the Empire City track was commenced this afternoon. The principal feature was a 100 mile race for stripped touring cars. Ever since automobiling racing became a sport there have been demands for a long race for touring cars but this was the first response to the demand. Besides the 100 mile race, there are fixtures for stock cars selling at \$1500 or less; another at three miles for cars from \$1600 to \$2400; a five mile event for cars from \$3500 to \$5000 and a ten mile test for cars selling from \$2500 to \$3500. There is also a dealers handicap at five miles, an event for American cars, and a five miles international race open to all countries.

Alleged Railroad Trust on Trial.

St. Louis, Oct. 20.—The hearing of the government suit to dissolve the alleged combination of the Terminal Railway association which commenced on October 1st before Special Commissioner R. E. Rombauer is nearing conclusion. The suit is based on the governments allegation that the Sherman anti-trust law, is being violated by the alleged monopoly of carrier and railroad interests amongst St. Louis railroads. When the government evidence is finished the defense will be allowed ten days to introduce its defense and when this evidence is taken it will be submitted to the United States circuit court of appeals. It is expected that it will reach that body in time for consideration at its December term. Former Attorney General Crow of Missouri, who is senior counsel for the government has already examined 58 witnesses.
