PAVING

Opinions of Various Candidates for Council On Improving Salem Streets

As the city primary campaign proceeds, the Capital Journal desires to give the public some specific information as to the views of the various candidates on public matters, with the object in view of informing the public just where the candidates stand on subjects of interest, and invites their statements.

Mr. Gilbert said that personally he was in favor of street improvements, but was opposed to forcing such improvements upon others who were opposed to paving.

J. L. Stockton, who has been nominated for councilman in the second ward against A. N. Gilbert, says he is unqualifiedly in favor of cleaning up the city, and making substantial improvements on our streets. He is in favor of paving the business blocks with first-class pavement, and in favor of improving all the streets as far as the property is able to do it.

While talking to the reporter he had a petition in his pocket for the improvement of North Commercial street, where he has property, and considers that it would be a good investment to pay his share towards placing that street in first-class order.

He says the capital owes it to itself and to the state to push ahead with all the first-class improvements that it can make within its means. He takes the position that non-resident owners of property should be taxed for improvements, and should be compelled to keep their property up at least as well as resident owners, who are helping to build up the city.

State News

The Multnomah football team are playing against Albany at Portland today.

J. F. Davis, of Lents, Oregon, was shot Sunday by an unknown man, evidently a robber, but will probably recover.

Frank Brown was sentenced Wednesday to serve one month in the Umatilla county jail for having stolen an ax.

Mrs. Frank Bruner, of Oregon City, who was fatally injured two weeks ago by the explosion of a coal oil lamp, died Thursday.

Seven Oregon City men have pledged \$100 each toward the formation of a new Willamette Valley Chautauqua Association. The old association was dissolved Friday.

Rev. Henry Dixon Jones, of Pendleton, was found dead in his bed in Portland Thursday morning, at the residence of C. S. Jackson, whom he was visiting. Death was caused by heart failure.

The barn on the Grand Ronde Indian reservation, in Yamhill county, was destroyed by fire Tuesday, with all the contents. The loss is total, amounting to about \$2000.

Miss Faith Rowland, of Marengo, Iowa, this week traveled 2000 miles to wed Dr. Will S. Schultz, of Oregon City, the wedding taking place in Portland.

Tom Myers, of Pendleton, was shot and killed by an old man named Hironimus, on the range west of Meacham Thursday evening. The killing was the result of a quarrel over the bobbing of the tail of one of the old man's horses.

There will be a famine in tan bark at the two Albany tanneries this year, as the result of the big Santiam forest fire, which swept away all the tan bark gathered in that part of the country the past year. The tanneries are getting their shipments from California.

Henry Hose, formerly a soldier in the United States army, at an early hour Friday morning, slashed the throat of Mrs. Mary Doyle, with whom he has been living, in the Winchester rooming house, at Portland. The cause of the murder was a letter left by the woman telling him she was tired of living with him. Hose coolly washed his hands after the murder and went and informed the police.

Auto Tests at Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Oct. 20.—Under the auspices of the Philadelphia Automobile club the fourth annual endurance test for automobiles took place this afternoon. The contest aroused considerable interest among automobilists of the Quaker capital, who are said to be more opposed to such an event than they would be toward a speed race. This year the route is longer than before. The course is from Philadelphia to Doylestown, 29 miles; Doylestown to Quakertown, 17 miles; Quakertown to Pottstown, 25 miles, and Pottstown to Philadelphia 37 miles, giving a total distance of 108 miles.

Wm. R. Pfennig Dead.

The Long Beach, Cal., Daily Telegram, of October 15th, contains the following notice of the death of a former Salem man:

Friends and acquaintances of Wm. R. Pfennig, the well-known junior member of Sutcliffe & Pfennig, Jewelers, were grieved and shocked yesterday to hear of his sudden death, which occurred about 2:30 yesterday morning at his residence, 49 Chestnut avenue.

Mr. Pfennig was in his usual health Saturday morning. He closed his store about 10:30 and went home. Shortly after midnight he was taken ill with nausea, and soon after was seized with a violent vomiting. Mrs. Pfennig sent for the doctor, but before he reached the house he had passed away.

Yesterday morning the physicians held an autopsy on the body, when it developed that death resulted from regurgitation of an artery, which filled an auricle of the heart, and a blood clot formed.

William R. Pfennig was born near LaPorte, Iowa, October 15, 1867, and moved to Oregon in 1892. In 1897 he was united in marriage to Miss Phoebe Smith, who survives him. In 1903 Mr. Pfennig moved to Long Beach and entered into partnership with his brother-in-law, Joseph Sutcliffe. He was courteous, jolly and speedily made friends.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at the late residence, and were conducted by Rev. J. Lewis Smith, of the First Baptist church. The Odd Fellows and Woodmen, of which orders he was a member, attended and took part in the services.

He leaves, beside a wife, two brothers, Henry and Charles, of Iowa, and two sisters, Mrs. Harry Lewis and Mrs. Jacob Vogt, of Salem, Oregon.

Remarkable Discovery in Brazil.

Rio de Janeiro, Oct. 20.—A party of merchants and financiers from the United States availed themselves of the offer of the Brazilian government and today took over the plantation at Boa Vista where it is intended to raise a newly discovered plant which threatens to revolutionize the linen industry in all parts of the world. The name of the new plant is the Canhamo Braziliensis Perini and was discovered by Dr. Victoria Perino. This fiber combines the qualities of hemp and flax and its usefulness until lately was altogether unknown. Dr. Perino discovered it in its wild state in the forests of San Francisco at an altitude of about 1000 meters above the sea level and having gathered some seeds planted them and experimented with the product at his plantation near Roderio with highly successful results. Dr. Noll Pechanha, vice president elect of the republic, in his report to the government states that he will use every means in his power to advance the interests of this great coming industry and asks the government to encourage planters by appropriating a subvention of 30 cantos annually for a period of five years for the first factory erected. Prominent members of the government say that the industry will be helped to the fullest extent.
