GOING TO JAMESTOWN.

Jefferson Myers, Oregon Commissioner, Will Leave Tonight for Virginia.

The Oregon commissioner to the ter-centennial exposition that will be held next year at Jamestown, Virginia, Hon. Jefferson Myers, will leave Portland to night for Virginia. In appointing the Oregon commissioner, it was the intention of Governor Chamberlain to have Jamestown visited and a report made to the next legislature giving the particulars of the situation and recommending what steps should be taken by this state to best subserve the interests of Oregon.

The commission has no money to expend and Mr. Myers and the other members are paying the expenses of the investigation out of their own pockets.

The commission believes that Oregon, Washington and Idaho, embracing the Oregon country, should erect a joint building to cost something like \$60,000 which will contain the exhibits of all three states. A staff building can be constructed for that amount that will be as large and imposing as the state house.

Mr. Myers will remain in Virginia a month and will thoroughly investigate the situation. He will try to secure a location for the Oregon building or the joint building that will be near the buildings of New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio and the other populous Eastern states.

The exposition is already an assured success. The general government has appropriated \$1,900,000; Virginia has contributed \$350,000 and \$150,000 more by counties; Ohio, New York and Pennsylvania have made big appropriations and nearly every state in the union will have buildings and exhibits.
