**PLACED TODAY?** It is all right for the city council to try to get better service, and make these corporations serve all alike, but what right has the council to cut their earnings in two?

The true interest of the people is a better lighting service, better street-car service, and better water service, and to have corporations rendering this service making money and prospering.

We do not want any broken-down and crippled corporations in this city. We have had TOO MANY OF THEM IN THE PAST. We want larger corporations, employing more men, paying good wages, and giving better service.

Salem needs more electric lights, a larger gas plant, extension of streetcar lines, more suburban electric lines, a larger freight and passenger depot, and all corporations making money.

To cripple any corporation doing business here is FOLLY OF THE WORST KIND. Public ownership is the only alternative if we do not want these public service corporations to make money and help build up the city.

Regulation of charges to produce equality of rates to all, to improve or increase or EXTEND THE SERVICE IN THE INTEREST OF THE PEOPLE is all right, but to cut the earnings down to virtually confiscation of the property, is an injury to everybody concerned.

### A DEFECT AND A REMEDY.

Governor Chamberlain has written for the San Francisco Call an article commending the initiative and referendum and the primary election law of Oregon, one of its first fruits. He thinks the law is satisfactory in general and finds but one objection, which he thus explains with a suggested remedy:

"There is only one objection to it in Oregon, and that is one which can be easily corrected. It is expensive for those seeking nomination for office, and the candidate who has an unlimited amount of money has a better opportunity of bringing his candidacy to the attention of the voter through the press and other bureaus of publicity, which, when properly organized, cost large sums of money. I would suggest as a panacea for this evil that expenditures in campaigns be limited by law and candidates required to furnish under oath itemized statements of expenditures and pronouncing severe penalties against those who fail to comply with the law or in other respects violate its terms."
