COOS BAY FISHING NEWS.

Interesting Items Touching an Important Local Industry.

"The run of silver salmon in Coos Bay is heavier than it has been since 1870," said J. N. Shahan, of Empire, to a Times reporter.

"The cannery at Empire was forced to close down for several days, as the force of can makers was not large enough to keep up with the work. On Thursday last there were many tons of fish piled up on the cannery wharves, and the supply of cans was soon exhausted.

"It was really a good thing that the cannery was forced to close down for a few days. The way the fish are running now they will simply swarm to the spawning grounds in the Coos, Coquille and Umpqua rivers, and will do more to propagate their species than the government hatcheries could hope to accomplish under the best of conditions."

The run of chinook salmon continues, but it is light, and the fish are only taken by the cold storage companies. Fishermen receive 50 cents each for chinook salmon, while

the silvers are worth 10 to 15 cents at the cannery.

"There are a whole lot of silver salmon wasted," said a fisherman last evening. "The few who fish for Chinook salmon got hundreds of silvers in their nets every night. The fish are dead when hauled into the boat and are thrown over board because there is no market for them. Some day the men may wish they had these fish."—Coos Bay Times.

DEATH OF ALBERT HALL.

Former Citizen of Marion County Died Saturday at Home at Marquam.

Albert D. Hall died at his home at Marquam, Clackamas county, Saturday, of Bright's disease. The funeral was held at Woodburn today.

Mr. Hall was 49 years old and was born at Woodburn. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Hall, Oregon pioneers, and he lived nearly all his life in this city and was universally esteemed. He is survived by his wife and five children.

county, the Ben Hayden farm, the Mark Skiff place and many others. The papers were opened in senate room No. 1, and will be tabulated and platted to show acres of tillable land, timber products, springs, etc.

The Blank Applications.

All who submit lands to the state are required to fill out the following form:

To the State Board of Public Building Commissioners of the State of Oregon:

Gentlemen:

The undersigned (owner's names) hereby offer and agree to sell and convey to the State of Oregon, by a good and sufficient deed of conveyance, with the usual covenants of warranty, the following described tract of land, containing . . . acres, as a site for a school for feeble minded and epileptic children, for \$. . . per acre, upon payment of the purchase price therefor, and in consideration of one dollar and other valuable considerations, the receipt and sufficiency whereof is hereby acknowledged, hereby agrees to furnish to the State Board of Public Building Commissioners upon demand thereof by said board a complete abstract of title of said lands, and to make and deliver such deed of conveyance upon payment therefor at any time when the same shall be demanded by said board within four months from October 22, 1906.

Description by metes and bounds or legal subdivisions follows.

Then follows signature and post-office address of owners, and a description of the property and improvements, setting forth the following facts:

Total number of acres.

General character of property, soil, exposure, extent of hill and level land, etc.

Number of acres of cultivated land.

Number of acres in brush.

Number of acres in timber.

Number of acres rocky.

Number of acres in regular cultivation.

Kind of crops grown during the year 1906 and yield per acre on the average.

Description of orchard on the farm.

Description of dwelling and out-buildings on the property.

Description of water supply on the farm, flow in winter and summer.

Description of flowing water, giving source and volume.

Distance of nearest railroad or trolley line.

Distance to nearest steamboat line.

Will Further Investigate.

The state board will take time to investigate the merits of the properties, and will probably go over some of them. Closeness to railroad transportation and electric lines will cut some figure, and it is understood that many of the tenders are accompanied by propositions to get connections with electric lines. Some of the owners were present in person, and others were represented by real estate men. Some of the lands are submitted with elaborate plats, as the state asked for 800 or 1000 acres in one body, to prevent selling small tracts for speculative purposes, and then sell the state adjoining lands at higher prices, as has been the custom in the past. Secretary of Dunbar says the state will make money by purchasing a large tract at present prices, as all lands in the vicinity of the state capital are advancing faster than in any other part of the state. The wood supply will also cut quite a figure in determining the purchase. Some of the tenders had this in view, and make showing of immense amounts of fuel supplies.

The Turner Tract.

One of the most important tracts of land offered the state is what is known as the Turner lands, opposite the state reform school, about five miles from Salem. There are 926 acres, more than half heavy timber, estimated to have 100,000 cords of fuel wood on it. Mill creek runs through it, with a fine water power. It is on the Southern Pacific and the Salem-Mehama electric road runs through it. There are seven springs on the land, and the cultivated land of about 300 acres is all in one body. The land is principally owned by Mr. Turner and his sister, who gave the Tabernacle building to the Christian church at Turner. There is a site for the institution on the cleared land that overlooks the whole city. J. W. Hodson, of the real estate firm of Knight & Hodson, is looking after the deal for Mr. Turner, who has joined two smaller places with him in one elevated tract. The land is put in at \$45, \$55 and \$65 per acre,

according to what the timber cruisers estimated the wood would cut at present market prices.

A conference is in session at Salem to draft irrigation laws for this state.

Parts of Wyoming are suffering from severe cold and heavy snowfalls.

There is a great struggle in the British parliament over a progressive education bill, which the house of lords is resisting.

Divers have passed cables under the sunken French submarine vessel, and it will be raised.

A man in La Crosse, Wis., has sold 150,000 acres of Oregon pine timber land to the Weyerhaeuser syndicate for \$300,000.

There is a fuel famine in the Spokane territory, and coal or wood are very hard to get in that city.

There is great demand for common labor in the Yakima valley at \$2.50 per day.

Clackamas county has decided to have an annual county fair.

A distillery for the manufacture of denatured alcohol will be built at North Bend, Coos county. Alcohol to burn for power will be made from potatoes.

State News

Portland 1, Los Angeles 2, was the score at Los Angeles Sunday.

A fine crushed rock road is being built from Myrtle Point to Coquille City.

The Schillers baseball team defeated the Hop Golds at Portland Sunday by a score of 13 to 6.

More than 20 miles of track have been laid out of Hillsboro, on the new line toward Tillamook.

Dog poisoners are at work in Astoria, and several dog owners are short on dogs.

An insane negro woman was caught on the train near Glendale Saturday, and taken to the asylum.

W. H. Husted, of Grants Pass, was robbed of his fine gold watch and chain and \$65 Saturday evening, near the depot yards at Grants Pass.

A. Fiske, a farmer living near Oregon City, is experimenting with ginseng, and will have quite a large crop this year.

Thirty-one prisoners are confined in the stockade at the Multnomah county rock quarry at Kelly's butte, on the Powell valley road.

Memorial services were held at the Portland Y. M. C. A. auditorium in honor of the late Reno Hutchinson, who was murdered in Spokane last week.

David Zimmerman, of Needy, died at his home there Wednesday. He was an old pioneer from Missouri, having settled in Oregon in 1849.

The twelfth semi-annual district convention of the Degree of Honor of Lane county was held at Junction City last week.

A small freight wreck below Harrisburg Friday evening completely tied up passenger traffic for ten hours.

In the first regular game of the season at Eugene, the U. of O. football team defeated the Astoria team Saturday by a score of 10 to 0.

Coos Bay is to have a plant for the manufacture of denatured alcohol. It will cost a quarter of a million, and it is expected to be in operation within four months.

F. M. Bundy, of Susanville, Or., shot himself in the head at Walla Walla Tuesday, dying instantly. There is supposed to be a woman in the case.

The city election held Saturday at Cottage Grove, authorizing the city council to amend its charter in favor of granting licenses, carried by three votes.

A number of Jefferson people have bought stock in the Little Mayflower mine, near Sumpter, which has proven to be one of the richest mines in that region.

E. J. McClanahan, of Eugene, is going to establish a factory for making poultry brooders. He will secure California red wood, which is adapted to such uses.

One of the largest transactions of timber lands ever made in Southern Oregon was consummated Saturday morning, when Attorney L. E. Bean, of Eugene, closed a deal for the sale of the famous Quartz Creek tract of timber lands, located on the McKenzie river, 50 miles from Eugene.

The little horse street cars, which have been the laughing stock of Albany for so long, will soon be a thing of the past. Plans are being made to build an electric railway system in that city.
