FORMING WATER LAWS**Prominent Men From All Over the State Trying to Regulate A Water Code**

The committee appointed at the water conference recently held in this city, of which G. W. Allen, of Portland, is chairman, met in the state library room of the capitol this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock to begin its labors in formulating a code of water laws, that the next legislature will be asked to enact.

Not all the members of the committee or the advisory board have yet arrived in Salem, but others are expected tonight and tomorrow morning and the conference is expected to be in session for several days.

Chairman Allen, Judge Stephen A. Lowell, of Pendleton; Franklin T. Griffith, of Oregon City; Judge Geo. T. Baldwin, of Klamath Falls; Mr. Perkins, of Medford; J. S. Green, of Eugene, and several others arrived in Salem this morning. State Engineer Lewis and ex-Governor W. P. Lord, of Salem, were in attendance.

In speaking of the proposed code this morning, Judge Lowell said: "The biggest difficulty this committee will have to encounter will be to harmonize the difference of opinion between the irrigators and the users of water for power. The committee has a large and important work before it, and it is important that a uniform law shall be enacted that will be just and equitable to all classes of water users."

The work that this committee will do has been long needed in this state. As a matter of fact Oregon may as well have no water laws as to continue under the present conditions. The Raley law, the King law and the law passed at the last session of the legislature are in force, but the Oregon laws provide no penalties for violation, and no man in ordinary circumstances can invoke the aid of the courts to protect his rights, because it means a long and costly series of litigation in the civil courts.

Attorney-General Crawford, Judge Wheelodon, of The Dalles; Senator Hart, of Baker; Hon. W. J. R. King, of Malheur; R. R. Johnson, of Echo, and other prominent citizens are members of the committee, and most of them are expected to be here.

Mr. King came up on the 10:38 train, and will take an active part in the meeting.

Willamette and Washington to Meet in Basketball.

According to private correspondence received by a student at the University of Washington, the girls' basketball team of Willamette University will this fall make a tour of the northwest and will try to arrange a game with the state university. Already the girls have organized their team at the Oregon institution and they expect to have a strong aggregation this year. Their success last year and the prospects for a strong five this fall are the reasons for their determination to make a trip through Washington to test their strength with all the girls' teams in this section.

The girls at the University of Washington have not begun practice yet, but the team will be organized this week or next. Basketball has always been popular with the co-eds at the 'varsity, and this year they should have a good team if all the veterans who are in college turn out for the team. The possible game with the Willamette University co-eds should be a drawing card as it will be the biggest contest of the kind ever pulled off at the university. Heretofore two girls' basketball teams, representing colleges of the northwest, have never played a game at the university. It is thought that the 'varsity girls will be ready to accept the Willamette challenge whenever it comes.—Seattle Times.

**JASPER JENNING'S FATE.****Life of Josephine County Boy Now in Hands of Supreme Court.**

The appeal of Jasper Jennings, convicted of the murder of his father, will be argued in the supreme court tomorrow. Clarence L. Reames of Jacksonville, deputy district attorney, will represent the state and Harry D. Norton will appear for the appellant. Both lawyers are in Salem now.

Newton M. Jennings was murdered in his cabin near Grants Pass September 7, 1905, and suspicion pointed to Jasper, his son. Jasper told a story that implicated Dora Jennings, the murdered man's daughter. After a sensational trial the girl was acquitted. Jasper was tried first, was found guilty and convicted. He was sentenced to be executed last March but a stay of execution was granted, pending the appeal to the supreme court. If the verdict of the lower court is affirmed young Jennings will have to hang, unless the governor intercedes.

STREET IMPROVEMENTS.**A Meeting of Property Owners on Court Street to Meet.**

There is to be a meeting of the street committee at the police court room Tuesday evening at 7:30 o'clock. They are to meet with interested property owners on Court street to consider the proposition of paving Court street from Commercial to Church. A similar improvement has been ordered on State street with bituminous pavement, and it is hoped by some of the wide-awake property owners, who are anxious to go ahead that the movement may materialize in a business-like manner. All interested in paving are invited to come out.

Insurance Costs Too Much.

Indianapolis, Oct. 22.—After a year's work the special committee reported to the governor today that insurance costs the people too much, on account of the excesses of the companies, and recommended a year's dividend law.

Candidate Arrested.

Boise, Idaho, Oct. 22.—Coroner Farmer arrested Robert Lansdon at Weiser this morning. He is charged with embezzlement and falsifying public records. Lansdon is sheriff of Washington county, and a candidate for secretary of state.

Topeka, Kan., Oct. 22.—At the annual meeting of the Farmers' Co-operative association held here today 2500 delegates from Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, Missouri, Colorado, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia registered. The gathering was the largest of its kind ever held in the United States. Mr. L. N. Holmes, of Bernice, Louisiana, president, explained that the object of the congress was to unite the farmers of the United States in a permanent organization to control farm products and to secure the enactment of laws favorable to agriculturalists. None of the Mississippi valley states, he said, had a law regulating the organization and control of co-operative societies. Kansas has a law to cover the subject but it was inadequate. It limited the capital stock to \$100,000 and provides no means for regulating the of stock which one member may vote. As there are hundreds of telephone, insurance companies and elevators owned by farmers the congress would consider the best means for co-operation. B. H. New York, Oct. 22.—So great is the scarcity of labor in Georgia, Alabama, Kansas that the progress of several railroads is being greatly retarded. In Georgia the construction of several lines is almost at a standstill and the same complaint comes from Arizona and New Mexico. A labor agent here has announced that he can give employment to as many as 20,000 up tomorrow.
