HUMBUGGING TESTS.

John E. Lindberg, a crack butter-maker in Minnesota, touches up in the Dairy Record the way some creameries juggle with the Babcock test. The following is an extract from Mr. Lindberg's article:

Every once in a while that test question bobs up. Will the creamery boards ever insist on a correct test? I visited a creamery the other day where there was not any greater variation in the test for June than three points. Every patron's milk tested either 3.6, 3.7 or 3.8. Think how fortunate the sinner must have been who ran that creamery! Everyone had about the same test as his neighbor, so why should he kick? I asked the treasurer if he thought the test was right and he said: "No, but what shall we do?" Now, at my creamery the test varied 11 points in June, 3.3 was the lowest and 4.4 the highest. Think what a glorious opportunity for kicks! Still none came. I have gotten my patrons to understand test variations fairly well and they know better than to insist on an equal, nonvarying test.

OREGON'S ADVANCEMENT.

As a result, our timber is in big demand, capitalists are falling over each other to get hold of our magnificent water powers, railroad enterprises are battling with each other to see which shall first reach the land of promise.

All this while the agriculturalists and business men are not silent lookers-on. What is good for the capital of the country is good for others and the scramble extends all down the line to the common laborer who finds help scarce in Oregon and good wages awaiting him.

The half million mark has been passed in population and there was never such wholesale inquiry about Oregon from all over the union as prevails at the present time, and letters of inquiry are reaching here by the score every day.

BRINGING YELLOW JOURNALISM TO ACCOUNT.

It has been known for a long time that the big metropolitan papers were publishing advertisements and reading matter that was unlawful.

But they are large concerns AND OWNED BY RICH MEN, and might do things that the smaller newspapers could not attempt without danger.

But it seems that grand juries have not that terror and respect for the millionaire law-breaker, be he bank robber or publisher of bawdy house literature.

James Gordon Bennett, proprietor of the New York Herald, has been indicted by a federal grand jury for SENDING ALLEGED OBJECTIONABLE MATTER through the mails.

The Herald corporation and Manly Gilliam, advertising counsel, are also indicted on eight counts, the penalty in each count for conviction is five years and \$5000 fine or both. There should be no shielding of Bennett because he is a millionaire or A GREAT NEWSPAPER PUBLISHER.

He has laid the foundation of his millions publishing what decent newspaper men would not dirty their hands with.

Everybody knows that certain infamous advertisements could be found in the Herald that were not admitted into decent newspapers.

This has gone on until public sentiment has made progress, and the publisher of the Herald HAS NOT KEPT PACE WITH IT.

Living abroad, he has got the corrupt European idea that vice is lawful as an asset of business, and it has been a big asset with the Herald.

The new theory of going after the big fish may reverse the parody on justice that only poor men are convicted of anything.

The time may come when the millionaires may crowd the prisons that have so long yearned FOR THEIR PRESENCE THERE.

There will be a day of reckoning for the millionaire law-breakers of this country, and the good work should begin with James Gordon Bennett.

NEPOTISM BRINGS HARVEST OF GRIEF.

In St. Louis gigantic frauds have been unearthed in the sub-treasury and a United States district attorney is mixed up in the crime.

Frederick W. Lehman of St. Louis had been appointed a special assistant to the attorney-general of the United States. His duties cover all legal matters, covering a defalcation of \$61,000 in the United States sub-treasury at St. Louis.

District Attorney Dyer, whose son was paying teller in the sub-treasury, was suspended pending investigation.

Dyer writes a pathetic letter asking to be relieved of all duties in connection with the shortage, and will devote all his energies to establishing the innocence of his son.

Lehman was formerly of Des Moines and went to St. Louis to become counsel for The Pullman Car Company in the West.

The pitiful confession of the federal prosecutor, who has been removed, that he will try to save his son, proves THE WEAKNESS OF NEPOTISM.

Any federal official who uses his position to secure the appointment of a relative should be removed from office.

A country with eighty millions of people all supposed to be equal politically and before the laws should nip nepotism in the bud.

The powerful official classes that are growing up will fasten whole families upon the public payrolls and THEY WILL BREED CORRUPTION.

No man will exact full performance of duties from a relative or hold a relative to strict accountability in public office.

It has been tried in this state and has always brought those to grief who practiced it. And it always will.

HAINES FOR PRESIDENT.

Hon. E. W. Haines, of Forest Grove, is the leading candidate for the presidency of the senate.

The votes are about evenly divided between Malarkey and Hodson, of Portland, and Haines, of Washington.

Haines is slightly in the lead, if he can rely on the votes of Marion and Linn. He is said to have them.

If Haines develops strength he will get Whealdon, of Wasco. In that case he will make it all right.

Of course, there might be a deadlock, when many would turn to Kay, of Marion county.

As the matter stands the odds are in favor of Haines, a clean and competent man for the place.

THE SPEAKERSHIP.

Hon. Frank Davey, editor of the Statesman, has been endorsed for the speakership by the members of the Marion county delegation.

Hon. B. F. Jones, of the Polk-Lincoln district, is a candidate. He stands for appropriations for the rivers and harbors.

Hon. W. L. Vawter, of Jackson county, is the Southern Oregon candidate, and will have a large following.

There will also be a Portland candidate, as the Portland senators cannot unite on a president of the senate.

Any one of the gentlemen named is qualified and competent to fill the office, as the house is all Republican but one.

The Albany Herald has just sold at good figures, and there are indications other papers are sought after.
