## HAVE THEIR LITTLE HOMES

The life of the working girl in Paris is different entirely from what it is in the large cities of the United States, for the reason that her work is different. One does not realize in this country how adroit and deft of finger she is. All those beautiful fancy articles which so delight the heart of the American woman, called "Article de Paris," are made or finished by her, such as fancy jewelry, buttons, metal and jet ornaments of all kinds. Also all imported artificial flowers are made by women; in fact, everything where a delicate touch is required. Of course, there are dressmakers and milliners, as in this country, but we speak only of the specialties of the Parisian working girl, under which classification comes also the "blanchisseuse de fin," made famous by DuMaurier's "Trilby." This worker does the most artistic work in fine laundering, really unknown on this side of the Atlantic. Few women do clerical work. In Paris that is men's occupation.

### Has Her Own Charming Home.

In Paris the working girl does not live in a boarding house nor does she board anywhere. She has her own home, be it ever so simple. She does not consider it proper nor honorable to be without "unchez elle." Generally this home consists of but one room, usually an attic room on the fifth or sixth floor, but always in a district and a house of repute. In this room cleanliness reigns above all. In spite of the fact that necessarily in contains enough objects to fill three ordinary rooms, the most perfect symmetry prevails. It is a secret how it is done, and it really is marvelous. Here are flower pots on the window sills and birds in the cages. It is altogether a charming abode.

### Coffee at 1 Cent the Cup.

In the morning she makes her coffee, or she may buy it already made. Many women sell it in the street under a "porte cochere." For 1 sou one may buy a cup of coffee, chocolate, or milk. For the same amount of money one may purchase a roll or a slice of bread cut from the loaf. Also a slice of fresh butter may be bought for 1 sou. As table butter is sold unsalted it is important to procure that which has been freshly churned the same day. The merchants are required to put labels on their butter indicating which is today's and which yesterday's, etc.

At noon the girl buys her dinner already cooked and carries it to her room to eat. For 10 cents she procures a juicy piece of meat and a dish of vegetables, all hot, called "une portion." She buys these at a restaurant without going inside. It is handed to her through the window in order to save time, and also many of the girls are too modest to mingle with the people they may meet there.

The working girl dresses plainly yet tastefully, and even artistically, but never beyond her means. Her stylish appearance surprises tourists. This is because her clothes are made at a good dressmaker's. She would never think of making her own. Her motto is "chacun son metier," or live and let live. Sunday is given up to recreation. In the outing season they flock to the suburbs, which are renowned for their beauty. There they enjoy themselves lunching on the grass or in one of those small rustic restaurants which border the river Seine. Fishing and rowing add to the pleasures of the day. In winter she goes to the theater, mostly to the matinee. A melodrama is her preference, where the good are rewarded and the villain gets his just dues at the end. Her sense of justice makes her select such a play.

The working girl marries early in life, but continues to work after as before, thinking aright that it is necessary to work while one is young in order to lay something aside for old age. Her wedding day is a picturesque affair. Usually the wedding takes place on Saturday or Sunday. After the civil ceremony (which always must precede the religious one) by the mayor of the "arrondissement" in which the bride resides they repair to the church, where the latter ceremony is performed. Ordinarily this takes place in the forenoon, so as to have time for the dejeuner, which is an important feature of that day.

### Odd Wedding Processions.

Bride and groom and wedding party betake themselves to some restaurant, usually in the Bois de Boulogne, to dejeuner in the open air when it is the season. As the young people are economical, they walk to the Bois in order to save the price of carriages. The bride is

dressed in white from head to foot. A wreath of orange blossoms is worn because it is the sign of virginity. From it falls a long white veil, which covers her toilet. The groom, clad in his new black suit, with white gloves and cravat and with a large bouquet on the lapel of his coat, is an awkward personage on this eventful day. The bridesmaids are dressed in their best and carry large bouquets.

The working girl makes an ideal wife and mother. She is her husband's helpmate in the truest sense of the word. When children come (of whom there never are more than one or two) they are sent to the country to be reared, and usually they are wet nursed by some peasant woman at the same time with her own. Arrangements, of course, are made beforehand. Statistics have proven that children raised thus are in better health than those brought up in Paris amid the greatest comfort. On Sunday father and mother go to see the little ones, and these are charming reunions.

### SCHOOL FURNACES HERE.

All Rooms at East School Can Now Be Heated and Classes Will Resume.

Two new furnaces for use in the East school arrived in the city last evening from the factory in Iowa, and will be placed in position today. The four heaters will be in operation tomorrow, and Principal Graham has announced that all the classes will be resumed at once.

### LITTLE INTEREST SHOWN.

Alderman Haas' Committee Had Quiet Time at Water Investigation.

The council committee on plumbing, to which was referred the task of wrestling with Alderman Haas' two new proposed ordinances, reducing the rates on gas and water and electricity, held its second session last night at the city hall. There were only a few spectators. Little or no interest was shown. The water company had no representative. John H. Albert, who was present, said he had no interest whatever in the water company, but he called attention to its franchise, which says its rates shall not exceed those of other Pacific coast cities of this size. Only eight citizens all told were present.

### To Shorten Route to Denver.

Denver, Oct. 25.—The proprietors of the Denver Northwestern and Pacific today commenced the construction of its extension to Salt Lake City. It is expected that the line will be built to Steamboat Springs by April next and from this point to Salt Lake City is about 300 miles. The extension is estimated to cost \$8,000,000 exclusive of \$4,000,000 for equipment and when it is finished the line between Denver and Salt Lake will be ten hours less than it is now by the Denver and Rio Grande.
