State News

Burglars are numerous in Pendleton.

A bear weighing 400 pounds was killed at Goshen, Lane county, Tuesday.

A New York man is planning to erect a \$10,000 laundry plant at North Bend.

The Eugene high school football team plays their first game of the season with Albany Saturday.

The Allen Fruit Company, of Eugene, will begin the work of packing apples on a large scale soon. Frost has killed a large lot of the tomatoes, so the run will be short.

Mrs. George F. Croner, of Eugene, is going to build the famous "Log Cabin" hotel on the McKenzie, which was destroyed by fire recently.

A sugar beet weighing 14 pounds and over three feet in circumference is shown at Pendleton, and is a fair sample of the enormous growth of beets in that region this year.

A 7-months-old Indian child was found dead in its bed with its parents at a Pendleton lodging house Tuesday morning, having died from suffocation.

Grants Pass is to have a stirring revival meeting some time soon. Four of the leading churches will unite and hire some noted evangelist. A tabernacle to seat 1000 people will be put up.

F. A. Page, of the firm of Tooez & Page, of Woodburn, Tuesday bought 102 bales of the J. C. and W. J. Bushnell lot of hops at Eugene, paying 10 1/2 cents.

A contract for handling 200 tons or more of freight between Baker City and Cornucopia was the direct fruit of the visit of John E. Searles, the millionaire owner of the Cornucopia mines of Oregon, Monday.

W. J. Sewell, former manager of the Potlatch Lumber Company, at Pendleton, has been charged with the embezzlement of \$1293, and a warrant is out for his arrest. He cannot be found at present, and it is thought he has left the country to avoid detection.

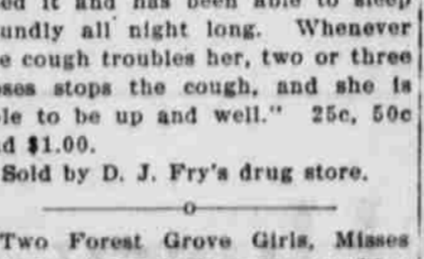
