

PRIMARY GROWING WARMER

A Bulletin Issued At- tacking Sound Bus- iness Men

Waters Administration Tak- ing No Hand in Mar- shal Fight

Circulars of candidates are beginning to fly through the mails. Anonymous bulletins are being issued to injure candidates not wanted by certain interests. One charges that the Waters administration are supporting Longcor for city marshal, and favoring certain candidates for aldermen, which is entirely false. A bulletin has been issued seeking to array certain interests against Messrs. Radcliffe and Vass for alderman in the seventh ward, and assuming that if Mr. Vass is elected he will dictate the selection of all the city officials. In the same manner it is aimed to array voters against Rodgers for mayor and against Stockton and Greenbaum for aldermen. It reveals that there is a slate made that does not want the services of able and incorruptible business men in the city council, who stand for the progress and welfare of the city.

The Anti-Bulletin.

As has been common for several campaigns a mysterious bulletin was scattered over the city Sunday. It is anonymous and intensely personal. As in the last three school elections the progressive candidates were labeled adversely in hopes of defeating them. Dr. Eppley was placarded a Hofer candidate, and the gang did their utmost to defeat him. He did prove to be a man who would not stand for any member of the board letting a contract without the authority of the school board. The latest bulletin is on the same line, and from the same source. It seeks to array prejudice against able and clean men by underhanded methods. Here it is:

Bulletin No. 4.

Mr. Voter: The old machine has had its wheels greased up, and, with the same "Old Gang" at the crank, are dishing up to the people of Salem some more of the political rot that is enough to put a decent voter to shame. The same crowd that has in the past boosted the various candidates for city offices, are out with schemes that every decent voter in the city should turn down.

Please let them answer a few questions:

Why was George Rodgers put up at the last minute against a man like Judge Hubbard? Simply to try to defeat Hubbard, because they could not use him as a cat's paw to rake chestnuts out of the fire for the grafters. Why did Stockton appear at the last hour? If possible, to defeat Mr. Gilbert, because they well knew that he could not be controlled by the machine. Greenbaum was put up because he would do as he was told, and not ask any questions. In fact, the Waters-Hofer machine must run things at all hazards. If this is not a Waters-Hofer deal, why did Lee Acheson leave a good position to take a hand in the city campaign and lead out for Vass, if he is not promised a job from the city in the way of fire chief? Has not Hofer secured the consent of Haas to run in order to get the prohibition vote? Has not Vass promised to place Jim

Penland on the night police force? Is not A. Dane working for Vass that his brother-in-law, H. H. Turner, of land fraud fame, can have a vote for city attorney?

Mr. Voter, you will make no mistake in voting for Dr. Keeler in the seventh. He is a temperance man, but no crank, and will see that the interests of your ward are protected. Why should John Longcor be given the preference over Doc Gibson, the best officer Salem ever had? Gibson cannot be controlled by the Waters-Hofer clique.

If the people want a clean administration they should vote this gang down wherever they may show up. Be true to your homes and your city, and put in men with whom you may safely trust the interests of your city.

A Bulletin Ticket.

A well-posted Salem Republican worker says:

"Bulletin No. 4 reveals that there is a bulletin ticket. The bulletin lets the cat out of the bag, and examination of the filings at the city hall show that all the bulletin candidates are in the same hand-writing and are hustling for office because some one tells them to. The men who are standing back and not hustling to get into the city council are certainly entitled to respect. Mr. Vass, Mr. Stockton, Mr. Greenbaum and Mr. Rodgers have never asked for the offices. They had to be pushed and persuaded by the best class of business men to become candidates, and are today resorting to no circulars, to no legging, have no one canvassing, and are leaving the matter of their nomination and election entirely to the citizens, regardless of party. Is a man who will hustle to get into the council, where he gets no pay, really fit for the place? What then can be his anxiety to get next? The business man will apply business methods to city affairs, and that is what any city needs. The grafter wants to get into the city council to do business with the people, to do 'politics'."

Who Are the Old Gang?

Has the Waters administration committed any crime besides push electric lines and street improvements, uncover rotten surveying jobs of the Geover variety, fight for permanent bridges and accumulate a cash surplus? Yes, Waters made it almost impossible to sell gravel to the city for streets, and candidates for alderman with gravel bars to sell are not wanted."

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DENY EDDY STORIES

Leader of Christian Scientists Neither Sick Nor Dying

Deny Eddy Stories.

Boston, Oct. 29.—Roused to action by the story in the Sunday papers that Mrs. Eddy is no longer the head of the Christian Science church, but a mere puppet in the hands of designing schemers, those nearest the aged woman today come to the front with statements of rebuttal. Lewis Strang, Mrs. Eddy's assistant secretary, tells how he introduced two reporters, seeking the truth about Mrs. Eddy's condition, and also introduced Prof. Kent to Mrs. Eddy. They say, after the interview, which was brief on account of business, each of the men expressed surprise at the remarkable good physical and mental appearance of Mrs. Eddy. Other leaders of the church are stirred to emphatic denials.

Concord, N. H., Oct. 29.—All the efforts of newspaper men to interview Mrs. Eddy failed this morning. Denials of the printed stories so far are only from persons who have most interest in having the sensation exploded. It was expected that Mrs. Eddy would come forth to check the increasing sensation, and either appear in public or give an interview.

Seattle, Oct. 29.—In Seattle, where the World's story also appeared, the Rev. Irving C. Tomlinson, of Concord, N. H., a member of the board of trustees, and a personal friend of Mrs. Eddy, in his lecture characterized it as absolutely false, according to the information received from the East, and his own personal knowledge. He declared that stories regarding the ill health of Mrs. Eddy came from enemies of the faith, and are without foundation, as is also the story of any possible disappearance of \$15,000,000 or the impairment of the private funds of either the church or Mrs. Eddy.

Another Eddy Story.

New York, Oct. 29.—It is practically certain that the conditions at Mrs. Eddy's home will be thoroughly investigated. Many Christian Scientists in this city brand the printed story as a falsehood; others are skeptical, and believe the leader to be under influence of associates, and in no condition of mind or body to attend to her duties. Unless Mrs. Eddy's associates have a disinterested committee to investigate and report, the initiative of such a movement will likely be started by the leading Scientists in this city.

The attitude of evasion, and the desire to state broad facts as expressed by Mrs. Eddy's managers have effect no more. They must prove or disprove the truth or falsity of the reports concerning the leader. Representatives of the press of the United States must be permitted to see and talk to Mrs. Eddy or the inference will be drawn that they cannot permit their leader to appear in public again. A Scripps news reporter interviewed General Streeter, Mrs. Eddy's attorney, today. He says it has been a year and a half since he was called into her presence until yesterday, when he visited her. He saw her driving daily, and says the story of a cancer is nonsense.

Mrs. Eddy Not Afraid.

Concord, N. H., Oct. 29.—The Eddy "cabinet" this afternoon decided that Mrs. Eddy would grant an audience to the Scripps news correspondent Thursday afternoon. Mrs. Eddy went driving this afternoon.
