

MURDERER SHEPHARD ARRIVED

Will Be Executed at Penitentiary on Last Day of September

Fred A. Shepard, the man convicted of one of the bloodiest and most revolting crimes ever committed in this state, was brought to Salem yesterday by Sheriff Elkins and three deputies from Crook county and is now confined in the penitentiary. He will be executed in the prison November 30.

Shepard was a farm hand and worked for a man on a ranch in Crook. He had a falling out with his employer, and one night entered his employer's house, killed him, made the terrified wife assist in dragging the body away and then made a fiendish attack on the woman.

Sheriff Elkins and his deputies also brought to the penitentiary three other convicted prisoners from Crook:

John F. Dell, for manslaughter, one year.

William Hogg, horse stealing, four years.

James A. Adams, horse stealing, four years.

Heavy Registration.

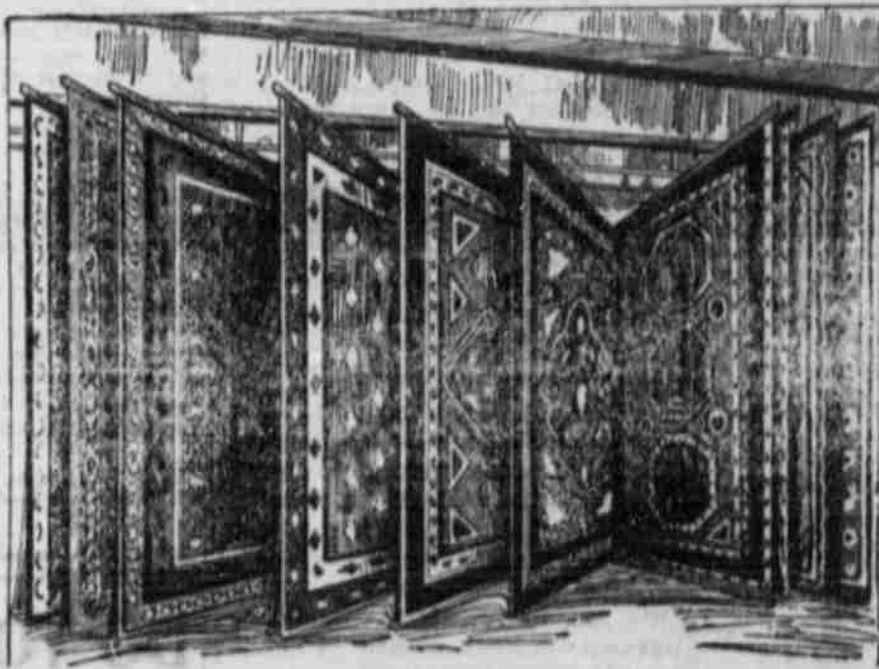
