Back from Iowa.

John F. Schunk and wife have returned from a trip to Iowa, where they visited at their old home stamping ground in Clayton county, including such centers as Elkader, Millville, Guttenberg, and Colesburg, in Delaware county. They were gone about four months, and also visited Western Iowa, Mapleton and Danbury, where they also have relatives and friends. They put in four months lacking four days, and then did not get around to see all they wanted to. They found old Iowa prosperous, although they had to keep busy getting out of the way of floods. One town was covered about four feet in places with dirt washed down by summer rains. The floods cost the counties annually thousands of dollars and are a terror to the taxpayers. They also stopped at Spokane, Palouse City and Moscow, where they saw immense wheat crops. Sizing it all up he concludes that Oregon is good enough for him and he would a little rather be here than back in Iowa. He also stayed in Seattle and Portland and considers both good cities, neither one much ahead of the other. He is not afraid to recommend the west to anyone who wants to pull up and leave the east. At Palouse City and at Moscow there is a great deal of street paving going on and a fine class of public buildings going up. He says electric roads are doing it. They got home all right, set up their phonograph and had music of their own right away.

OREGON'S BIG RED APPLES

Willamette Valley to Regain Its Old-Time Reputation

Apples from Hood River have a rival.

From the Willamette valley comes a new Richmond in the field, and the growers from Hood River and those from the Willamette valley will soon be struggling to see which can secure the highest price per box. At present the Hood River orchards are in the lead, but—

Well, just wait until the farmers up Woodburn way pray, spray and send their Baldwins to market, that's all.

Six hundred boxes of apples "as are apples" arrived in Portland today from Marion county, and they immediately began making a noise like Hood Rivers. When they are placed in a down-town show window Portland consumers will realize that Hood River is not the only apple orchard in Oregon.

From up Woodburn way came an apple enthusiast this morning with a line of blushing Baldwins of the first water. Listen, he speaks for himself.

"Everybody knows," said the booster, "that the Willamette valley can raise as fine apples as Hood River or any place else on earth. The trouble is, however, to convince the growers and make them cultivate their orchards. When fine apples come from the valley the dealers only want to give 75 cents or 80 cents a box for them. Sometimes it is possible to make them give \$1, but what we want at least, is \$1.25 wholesale, and they are worth \$1.75 to \$2 retail. But if we will take these great Willamette valley apples to dealers and say they are from Hood River—well, we can name our own price.

"What we want is to have the Willamette valley apple recognized. We're going to show what can be done in the apple line up our way. Today we will have in Portland a carload of perfectly sound apples, raised by W. M. Cline, near Woodburn. These will compare with any Baldwins that ever came from Hood River. We are starting a campaign for good apples in the valley. The growers need only be shown that they can get a good price to induce them to cultivate their orchards and pack the fruit properly.

"Very few growers pay attention to their orchards now, and no wonder. They only receive four-bits or so a box. In truth we receive many apples which are in no condition for the market, and we feed them to the hogs. But if we can induce a small number of farmers to specialize on apples and make them attractive for the market, others will imitate their example, and in a few years the Willamette valley will be putting out apples which will make Hood River hustle to keep up."

The war for supremacy for good apples is on. Please pass the apple sass.
