ACOB VOGT

ROOSEVELT TO SAIL NOV. 8

Precedent Will Be Set by His Leaving United States]

Washington, Nov. 1.—President Roosevelt will set sail from New York, November 8, on the first journey ever made to a foreign land by a president of the United States. It will be the beginning of his trip to Panama to investigate personally the conditions and general situation in the canal zone, and he will not return to Washington till the latter days of November.

The trip will be made on the new battleship Louisiana, which this week braved the storms of the tropics and brought the secretary of war safely to Hampton Roads. The two newest cruisers of the navy—the Washington and Tennessee—which have not yet had their final trials at sea, will act as convoys.

The President will leave Washington in a special train over the Pennsylvania railroad Monday night, November 5, arriving in Oyster Bay early Tuesday morning, to vote. It is understood to be his present intention to spend Tuesday there, when doubtless he will be visited by or be in close communication with his party leaders in New York, on account of the election. He will also probably spend the next day there, working on his message to congress, and he will leave there either late Wednesday night or early Thursday morning for New York, where he will board the Louisiana for his long contemplated trip to the isthmus.

Prefers the Louisiana.
Since the President announced his final determination to make the trip in November, the navy department has set to work to provide a suitable warship transportation and convoy for the navy's commander in chief. The new battle ship Rhode Island, the Louisiana's sister ship, which has just been completed at the New York navy yard and which had been under consideration, was scratched off the list for the reason, it is understood, that the President prefers the Louisiana.

One reason for this preference is said to lay in Secretary Taft's praise of that ship's splendid conduct in a storm. The President is said to have been greatly interested in the war secretary's description of the trip up through the two storms. Although the President has not formally asked for a convoy, it was decided by the navy department that the Louisiana should be accompanied in the trip by the newest cruisers in the service.

The President is considerably disappointed in the inability of Secretary Taft to accompany him. The Cuban situation has made that impossible and as Secretary Taft held down the lid in Cuba, so will he hold down the same lid in Washington during the President's absence.

The President will be absent from the White House at least three weeks, as it will require fully six days each way to make the trip, and he desires to have a week for his investigation on the isthmus. In case he should decide not to remain at Oyster Bay over Wednesday, he will probably leave Washington Wednesday night on the Dolphin. In either event, he will leave the Louisiana on the return trip at Hampton Roads and proceed up the bay on either the Dolphin or Mayflower.

The President will be a busy man during his trip, and he will be particularly busy both before and immediately after it. What, with watching the Cuban situation, the campaign in New York, preparing for the opening of congress, and making ready for his Panama trip, he will be rushed every minute up to the time he boards the warship. On his way to Panama he will continue the work on his message, on the return trip, if he does not encounter such a storm as prevented Secretary Taft from framing up his report on the Cuban situation, he will write such part of his message as will pertain to the canal. After his return to Washington and conference with Secretary Taft, he will conclude his message with his remarks on the Cuban situation.

Novel Merit System for Employees.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Nov. 1.—The Story and Clark Piano company, of Grand Haven, today announced a novel award system for their employees. They have set aside \$2000 in cash prizes which will be awarded men in different departments in their works on November 1, 1907. The department of the men, their arrival at the shop morning and noon and their work will all be averaged up and at the end of the year, the prizes will be awarded. The first prizes in the different departments are in most cases \$100, and a second prize of \$50 is awarded. The superintendents and foremen are not included in the contest and only working men will compete.

Railroads Cut Rates.

New York, Nov. 1.—The Central Passenger association today reduced fares to 2 1/2 cents per mile in all its territory east of Illinois in which the state legislatures have not already made the maximum rate of two cents. This will reduce the local rates only in Indiana and in Pennsylvania, west of Pittsburgh, as Michigan and Ohio have two cent laws. The new laws, however, involve a lowering of all the interstate passenger rates north of the Ohio river and west of Syracuse, N. Y. Reductions in fares will commence on the Lackawanna, Erie, Lehigh Valley, Baltimore and Ohio and Chesapeake and Ohio, the New Haven and in all the principal lines in the eastern states, at the same time.

American District Telegraph Co.

Minneapolis, Minn., Nov. 1.—The deal whereby the American District company of Minneapolis became absorbed in the Western Union and National District Telegraph company came into force today. Ex-Mayor John C. Haynes, president of the local company since its organization 22 years ago, was in no way connected with the merger. He disposed of all his old stock in the old company to the New Jersey corporation and will not in any way be connected with the new management. Mr. A. T. Williams, the general manager of the local company, will be manager of the merger company from today.

Great Brick Making Combine.

Sharon, Pa., Nov. 1.—With the exception of the Harbison-Walker Refractories Co., all the brick making firms in the country have agreed to a consolidation. The Harbison-Walker company is a corporation with a capital of \$2,500,000 and a capacity of 1,000,000 bricks daily. The contemplated merger will have a capital of \$25,000,000 and a daily capacity of 2,000,000 bricks. Options on all the plants to be consolidated have been obtained and expire today. While there are some objections to the valuations upon these plants it is almost certain that the merger project will be put through successfully.

Winnipeg Author in Minneapolis.

Minneapolis, Nov. 1.—Ralph Connor (Rev. C. W. Gordon) of Winnipeg, is in this city and will officiate at the dedication of the Grace Presbyterian church. The Rev. Mr. Gordon, who writes under the non de plume of "Ralph Connor" has written stories of Canadian and north-western life which have become classic. He has adopted a style of his own, which has become extremely popular all over the world.

Opening of the Quail Season.

Boston, Nov. 1.—The quail season opened today and a large number of sportsmen wended their way with dog and gun to the more secluded parts of the state. Shots were heard bright and early in all the country towns, as the sportsmen peppered away at the birds. Taking off of the month of October from the open season has had good effect for the number of quail has substantially increased. A good season is expected.

Half a Million for Missionary Work.

Omaha, Nov. 1.—The annual meeting of the Women's Foreign Missionary society was held in the M. E. church here today. The special business was the apportionment of funds to the several branches of the foreign missionary work. The sum apportioned amounted to over \$500,000.

New Federal Judge for Manila.

Washington, Nov. 1.—Today the resignation tendered by Congress man Newton W. Gilbert of the 12th Indiana district, takes effect. Mr. Gilbert proceeded to Manila where he has been appointed a federal judge.
