**Why Your Range Oven Burns Bread**

**H**AVEN'T you often taken a pan of bread out of the oven, burned to a crisp on the outside, and a mass of dough inside?

Or perhaps baked more on the top than on the bottom?

Besides, the damper is perhaps a slide affair on the side of the range, or a single door at one end of the fire-box. Consequently the fire is hot next the draft door, and hardly burning on the other end so the oven is not heated uniformly.

You should have a range that will not open up in the joints—a range that is so strongly and tightly built that there isn't the least possible chance for air leaks.
