SOME MARION GIRL

Will Visit the Jamestown Exposition Next Year As the Journal's Guest

OPPOSE BIEN CODE

Griffith Believes That Riparian Rights Cannot Be Removed by Legislature

In all probability, in the opinion of Franklin T. Griffith, the Water Law Commission will meet with strong opposition to some provisions of the proposed Bien code of laws to regulate the distribution and use of waters of the state when it meets again on December 4th, to resume its deliberations upon the draft, as already revised and amended to suit local conditions. Particularly so with respect to the first section of the code, the very foundation of the whole system of laws, which provides that "all waters within the limits of the state from all sources of water supply belong to the public and are subject to appropriation for beneficial use," and feels that some provisions must be made to suit conditions all over the state.

"The conditions in Western Oregon," said Mr. Griffith, who was in Salem last Saturday on private business, "are entirely different from those existing Eastern Oregon, for the reason that water is more valuable for the generation of power, logging purposes, etc., than for irrigation, and the same rules will not apply in both sections of the state. I also entertain serious doubts if the legislature of this state has the power to enact laws which will deprive riparian owners of their vested rights, and the provisions of the code may have to be modified so as to protect rights which have been recognized for years, and cannot, in justice, be disturbed."

"Conditions are altogether different in Oregon from those existing in other states, for the reason that all equitable laws and precedents have the old English or common law as their basic principle, and the supreme court of this state has respected the rights of riparian owners so many times and for so many years that it would be the next thing to impossible to start in upon a system of readjustment at this late day. In Wyoming, Utah and Idaho, where the Bien code was adopted, practically in its original form, there were no water rights or titles to be disturbed, and the 'abolishment' of them was unnecessary."

"However, when I say obstacles will be encountered in drafting a water code I do not mean that they will be insurmountable or serious, and I am satisfied that some means will be found to overcome them all, and draft a set of laws that will be satisfactory to all concerned, and acceptable to the State Legislature."

Tuesday this week fifteen hundred Salem school children will be dismissed until the following week. MANY TO ROAM THE STREETS, while according to laws of this state a teachers' association is held at Salem.

The theory of the legislature is that the teachers will be benefited by the association, and possibly they will be advanced professionally. But are they not already SUPPOSED TO BE EQUIPPED for the work they are engaged to do?

great expense and take them out of all employment.

Then along comes legislative wisdom and takes the time of thousands of school children in this county and practically wastes it for the purpose of holding associations for further training teachers.

If this time were taken for the direct benefit of the children and the organization of the schools FOR SAME HIGHER PLANE OF USEFULNESS, the work of the legislature might be commended.

The teachers are assumed to be qualified to carry on the school work for which they have been engaged. An absurd law takes the teachers out of school, turns the children on the streets, closes the schools for nearly a week, and there is no way for the school districts to make up for this loss of time.

Any other kind of labor would be docked for suspending work practically the better part of a week. In the county schools THE DISTRICTS HAVE TO STAND THE LOSS, and the teachers are put to expense.

Why could not this association have been held during the holidays or summer vacation without disorganizing the work of the schools? The answer is that an annual institute must be held in each county once a year and all cannot have them in the holiday or vacation time.

Many of the counties manage to hold their institutes without breaking into the school months. Marion is not fortunate. Besides the number of professional institute workers is limited.

It is claimed there is only a small number of men in the state who can do the institute work properly, and almost no women who are capable. This is again the fault of the legislature.

The law should make it possible to hold all these county institutes IN SUMMER TIME, when there is a long three or four months vacation. It should be possible to hold a county institute without requiring the presence of the state superintendent or any particular instructor.

The legislature should look into this matter and correct the evil of county institutes suspending all the school work of the county. It is too great a sacrifice of the time of children and the comfort of parents.

FIGHTING BOURNE.

The Dalles Optimist and other papers are beginning an apparently concentrated attack on Jonathan Bourne, opposing his election to the United States senate.

There is believed to be an organized plan to SWITCH BOURNE in spite of the fact that he got the nomination and election on the direct plan of popular choice.

The Dalles Optimist is a paper recently established and edited by A. Bennett, the man of Rabbittville fame who is vice-president of the State Development League, with headquarters at Portland.

The fact that Theodore B. Wilcox is president of the State Development League, and Tom Richardson secretary may or may not have any significance. But IT APPEARS AS IF THERE WERE METHOD IN THE ATTACK.

Mr. Bourne is the first aspirant for the senate to break in on the old way of capturing senatorships, and there are many politicians who do not take kindly to the innovation.

Nomination and election by the people will win in the end, but it will have to run the gauntlet of a spirited fight in Oregon.
