FORM STATE LEAGUE

Basketball Enthusiasts Met Saturday and Arranged Schedule of Games

The Oregon State Basketball league was formed Saturday night at a meeting held in the Y. M. C. A. parlors by basketball enthusiasts from the different colleges in Oregon. It is the intention of the league to raise the standard of playing in the state and to settle the question of championship.

The following officers were elected: President, Charles Mackie, of Portland Y. M. C. A.; secretary, A. M. Grilley, of Portland; treasurer, E. J. Winans, of Salem.

The representatives were: Messrs. Easter, Charles Mackie and A. M. Grilley, of the Portland Y. M. C. A.; Allen of the M. A. A. C.; Shaw, of Dallas College; Wilson, of Pacific College; Winans, of Willamette University; Markel, of Pacific University; Forbes, of the Salem Y. M. C. A.; and Tharp, of the Monmouth Normal School.

The Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis, and the University of Oregon, and McMinnville College were not represented at the meeting. Both Oregon and McMinnville are undecided as to the putting out basketball teams the coming season. Corvallis on the other hand, appears

not to favor the organization of the league, and as a result it is possible that none of the league teams will meet the "Aggies" at basketball this year.

It was decided to have a central committee composed of three members whose duties will be to select officials for all games.

A committee on officials consisting of Mackie, Grilley, Tharp and Allen was chosen. It will be the duty of this committee to select the official for each and every game.

The central committee composed of Messrs Mackie, Allen and Markel will act as arbiter in all disputes, misunderstandings and controversies arising among the various teams.

Each team will be required to place a guarantee of \$10 with the treasurer of the league to show its good faith in playing its entire schedule of games. In case of forfeit the \$10 will go to the team injured by its opponent by failure to play. The expenses of the referee will be borne equally by contesting teams.

Each representative presented a number of names and from these a list was made from which the official of each game will be chosen by the committee. They are as follows:
