NOT FREE
TO INSANE****Shall the State Be Required
To Pay for Chaplain for
Its Wards?**Should the state be expected or
required to pay ministers of the gos-
pel for conducting burial services at
the different state institutions, and
the question of the advisability of
creating the office of state chaplain
were the most important matters up
for consideration before the Board
of Trustees of the insane asylum yester-
day afternoon.These questions were brought up
in connection with the report of Su-
perintendent Calbreath, for the
month of October, and the presenta-
tion of the bill of Rev. William Rob-
inson for the sum of \$103 against
the State for conducting burial ser-
vices over the remains of an equal
number of patients, at \$1 each. This
is the first time that a claim of this
nature has ever been rendered the
State, and it was the subject of pro-
longed debate, and finally allowed,
when the board was convinced that
the legislature had made special pro-
vision for compensating ministers
for such services, in the regular ap-
propriation for the maintenance of
the insane asylum, although it is not
specifically itemized in the bill.Governor Chamberlain then took
the position that the office of chap-
lain should be created, and he stated
that he intended to recommend such
action to the legislature in his forth-
coming message. He believes that
the question of sectarianism could
be avoided if the matter was han-
dled judiciously, and one chaplain
could officiate at all the state insti-
tutions located in and near Salem.Local agents of the State Agent
Company appeared before the board,
and proposed to install an automatic
fire alarm system, and connect it
with the city system being put in,
at the rate of \$86 per mile for the
line and \$30 for each box put in.
The question of whether the city de-
partment would respond to an alarm
outside of the limits then arose, and
it was decided that the matter be
deferred until it could be determined
whether the Salem City Council
would make special provision for
emergencies of this kind.Superintendent Calbreath's report
showed that the total number of pa-
tients at the institution, at the close
of the month, was 1436, and the
total expense for maintenance for
the month was \$8,211.94.**PLANS FOR NEW YEAR.****Members' Cabinet of Y. M. C. A.
