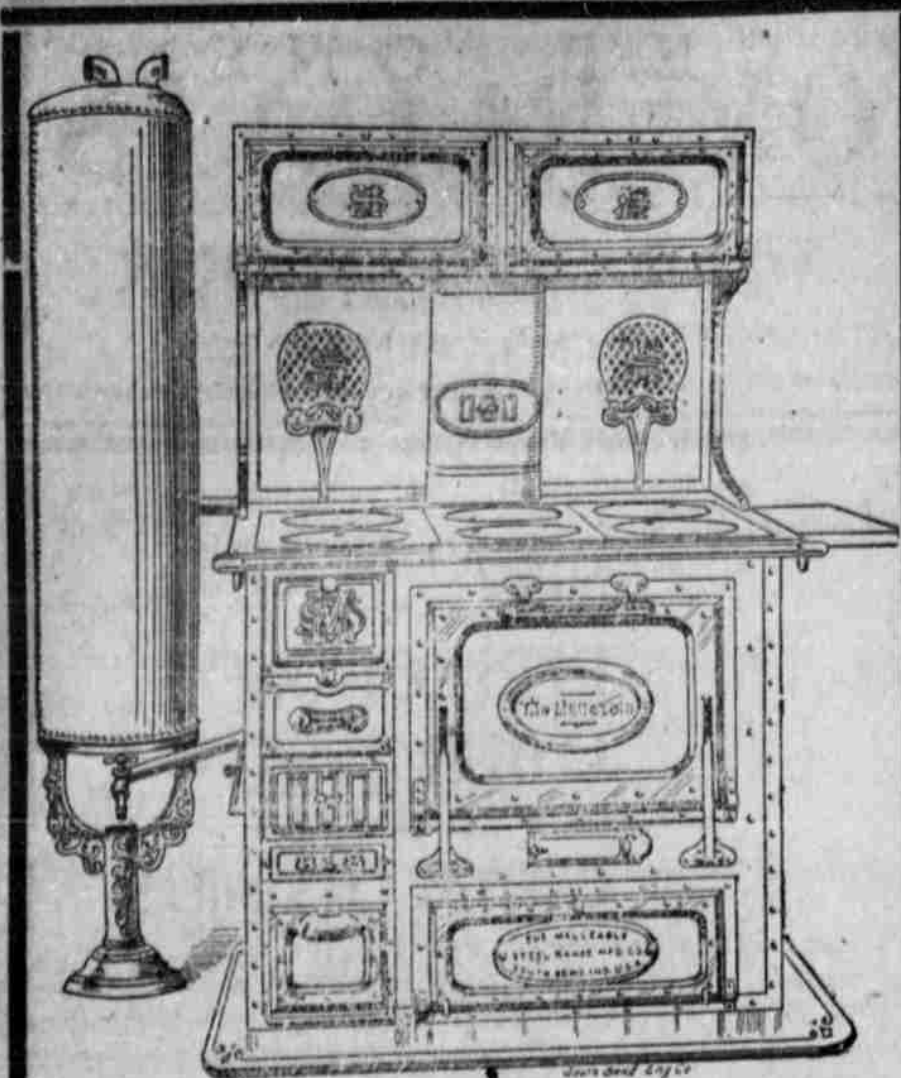

BOOSTING LEBANON INDUSTRIES

soil itself for a quarter of a century. He sought to impress his audience with the fact that this part of Oregon was the garden spot of Western Oregon. He said the soil could be made to produce 50 to 60 bushels of wheat to the acre. Cows could be made to net \$50 a year and more. He told of one man, who with 32 cows produced \$3200.

We must quit growing wheat, wheat, wheat. The continuous growing of grain meant mortgages on the farm. Clover and dairy cows piled up money in the banks. The doctor convulsed his crowd with some good stories.

He commented on the value of rotating vetch, clover, corn and grain. Following corn, wheat disked in on drained lands produced 46 bushels to the acre. Drainage was coming. So was irrigation. Forty tons of kale to the acre meant the doubling of dairy products. A ton of butter fat, worth \$600, took only 50 cents out of the land. A ton of grain took \$7.50 out of the soil.

Profits in Potatoes.
Sol Lindley said he was not much on talking but could grow spuds. On sandy loam the potatoes grew most perfectly. Not often could you get a crop on hill or prairie lands. Clover, vetch, rye or wheat plowed under made plant food. In the spring he plowed all vegetation under, and kept it well harrowed. Then in May he disked and in the middle of May he plowed a second time, dragging down in the afternoon. After dragging several times to kill weeds, he disked the land, and was then ready to plant it. For seed get the best and smoothest tubers. After planting harrow every few days, to keep weeds from starting. Use the weeder between the rows. After up a few inches cultivate well. After that cultivate shallow. He gave figures to show crops of five seasons.

From a tract of 2 1/2 acres he sold

668, for \$491.30. In 1902 1903 bushels were raised on 4 acres. In 1903 on 8 acres he had 3128 bushels, for \$1395. In five years he sold 7493 bushels for \$3540.37. Average price for five years 47 1/2 c. Cost of growing an acre, all work hired, was \$50.20 per acre, including seed and \$10 an acre rent for land. At 200 bushels per acre there was a profit of \$10 per acre after hiring all done. Rotate potatoes every third year. Two years in clover or some sod.

He figured one man could tend ten acres of potatoes and produce 2000 bushels of merchantable potatoes. At 30c he would get \$600 from the crop.

Tile Drainage.

Fred Groner thought this was in its infancy at Lebanon. Tile was first used in Sholes, Washington county, about 25 years ago. The first tile drain was produced there in the state. By too much cultivation the land got clammy and unproductive. Natural openings and cracks were closed.

He told of three tons of oats hay to the acre, five tons of timothy and a hundred bushels to the acre on beaver-dam land. White land that would not produce grain, when tiled, would produce immense crops, and grew better each year. He has tile drainage down to a selenite. To hear him talk one would conclude that merely a few red tiles in the corner of a field would make all the aqueous fluid skidoo. Tile would not come to the top of the grounds, but continuous cropping made the surface lower. Ditches not less than three feet deep and six to eight-inch tile were needed.

Tile of large size, put down 4 1/2 to 6 feet deep does away with any need of small lateral ditches. Mr. Groner can talk the face off of a whole agricultural college faculty on tile drainage. Lay the tile with the slope 200 to 400 feet apart. Dig holes to find where the water comes from. Do not try to put tile where the water shows on the surface. At least half an inch to the rod was needed for fall. With two inches fall to the rod tile half the size was enough. Water flowed faster on the same grade through larger tiles. Drain tile would convert poor farms

into the highest stage of production. Without drainage there was no thorough renovation of land possible. He said the lands in the Santiam country were better than in Washington county. Tile drainage was the key to success in every part of Oregon.

"I took a trip and traveled about 10,000 miles, just for the curiosity of learning what I could," said Groner. "We can produce more wealth per acre than land holds in California at \$500 per acre. Why is it? We lack development and improvement. Sell one-half your farm, put in tile drainage and get rich."

Mr. Shulmerick said his cows averaged \$104 a year per cow. They should average 300 pounds of butter per year. It cost him about \$46 a year to keep his cows. It was not what a cow would give the first three months, but what would she give for ten months. His cows were practically the get of one bull that he gave \$100 for at one month old. He doubled the product of his herd by breeding up his stock. His herd averaged 341 pounds of butter fat. He favored pumpkins and kale. Beets made too much work. The purple-top turnip was much better, and no dirt to clean off. Kale had much higher feeding value. Grow what was easiest handled.

The children of the public school sang a fine song, under the direction of Mrs. Bigby, and this closed the institute program Tuesday.

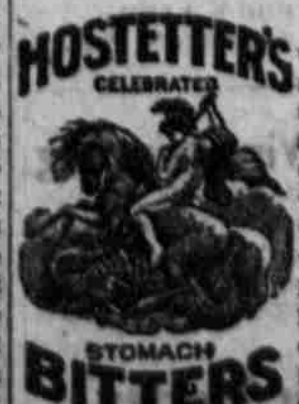

Bickers, of this city, superintendent of the state reform school during Governor Geer's administration, who is represented as having applied for reappointment, stated today that he had not applied for the place, but that he would if the present incumbent should resign or be removed.

Michigan's Record Beet Crop.

Lansing, Nov. 7.—The total beet crop this season in this state will amount to 245,000,000 pounds. Farmers and sugar manufacturers will reap a rich harvest as the crop is a record one. Thousands upon thousands of beet lands this year will pay as much as \$80 an acre while it is expected that the full crop in the state will yield \$7,000,000.

\$500,000 Fire.

Hamilton, O., Nov. 7.—Fire started in the Mehrum building this morning, and did a half million dollars damage before it was extinguished. The dry goods stores are the heaviest losers.
