Merger of Lumber Companies.

Charleston, Nov. 7.—A merger of lumber and railroad companies has been effected here and is causing considerable interest in the lumber regions in this and adjoining states. The merger will give one company control of the property and business of Williams and McKenith Lumber company, of Lumber, S. C.; Chatham Lumber company, of Durham, N. C.; the Charlotte Monroe and Columbia railroad from McVee to Jefferson, S. C., 20 miles in length through a lumber country, and the Durham and South Carolina railroad between Durham and Bostan 30 miles long. The newly formed company will have a paid up capitalization of \$1,000,000 and besides a large number of sawmills in the two states owns between 60,000 and 70,000 acres of heavy timber lands which have an immense supply of cypress and pine timber.

To Improve Cotton Crop.

Jackson, Miss., Nov. 7.—Owing to the threatened invasion of the Boll weevil Professor William Newell, state entomologist of Louisiana, Mr. J. G. Lee, director of the Calhoun experimental station, and Dr. S. A. Knapp have been appointed by the government as a commission to discuss ways and means to combat the destructive insects which are causing great damage to the cotton crop in Arkansas and Louisiana.

DISMISSES NEGRO TROOPS.

Roosevelt Gives Sweeping Order as Result of Texas Murder.

Washington, Nov. 6.—Unprecedented in the history of the army of the United States is the action of President Roosevelt, just announced, in dismissing in disgrace from the army the entire battalion of negro troops, because of their failure to disclose the identity of some of their number who had been guilty of violence and murder. As evidence of his intention to be fair to the troops, the President has accompanied the action by an order which may amount to court-martial of a white army officer of high grade, who was charged with having cast slurs upon the troops.

The report of Brigadier-General Carlington, the inspector-general of the army, relative to the riotous disturbances at Brownsville, Texas, on August 1, 1906, that resulted in the death of one citizen and the wounding of another was the basis of the President's action.

Professor Traver Has Resigned.

Pendleton, Nov. 7.—Professor L. R. Traver, city superintendent of schools, has handed in his resignation, to take effect at once. No reasons are assigned for the action. During the year and a half that he has been in Pendleton he has given the best of satisfaction. Regarding his plans for the future Professor Traver will say nothing, except that he will remain here till the first of the year, when he expects to go to Portland. No successor has yet been secured, as the resignation came as a complete surprise to the school board as well as to the public generally. Mr. Traver is one of the best known educators in the little town.

Professor Traver started his tenure of the Salem job for a number of years.

Wants Another Payton.

Albany, Or., Nov. 7.—Cash could Mary E. Cramer, of Baker, look upon the circuit court of Baker county as a divorce, seems to furnish an interesting story. In her complaint she alleges that she was married to the defendant in Pennsylvania and that about May 1, 1904, the defendant deserted her. She asks for alimony of \$20 per month and sufficient to prosecute the case. It has developed that the defendant has already obtained a divorce from the plaintiff in the action in Lincoln county, Oregon. The date of the decree granted is July 11, 1905.

Great Shortage of Coffee Crop.

Santos, Nov. 7.—Commissioners appointed by the government to make an estimate of the coffee crop will furnish a startling report as to the shortage—in fact the crop this season falls so short that the report will state the crop is a complete failure. The yearly crop in Santos and the Parana river up to the present yield about 13,000,000 bags but this season 3,000,000 bags cannot be placed on the market while the coffee is of inferior quality.

London, Nov. 7.—Owing to the failure of the coffee crop in Brazil arrangements are made for shipments from Patavia, Java, where an excellent crop reported.

New York, Nov. 7.—Owing to the shortage of the Brazilian crop importers here are about to raise the price of coffee. The increased price will take effect on or about November 10th.

United States Court Decides Express Company Common Carrier.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 7.—Judge Garland, of the United States court, in the case instituted by the United States Express Company against the South Dakota railroad commission, to test the jurisdiction of the board over express companies, today decided that express companies are common carriers, under the jurisdiction of the commission.

Alaskan Prosperity.

Washington, Nov. 7.—Since its purchase by the United States Alaska has produced nearly \$60,000,000 of furs, \$50,000,000 of salmon, more than \$90,000,000 of gold and many other products. Claim jumping which has been the bane of more than one of the larger placer camps in Alaska will be entirely abolished in Yukon territory, under the provisions of the new mining code. Compulsory arbitration is about to do away with mining legislation.

Governors' Day at Exposition.

Jackson, Miss., Nov. 7.—"Private" John Allen, of Tupelo, for twenty years official humorist of the national congress acted as master of ceremonies on "Governors' day" at the exposition here today. A street parade was one of the features of the day and when Congressman John Sharp Williams ascended the platform to deliver an address it was calculated that eight thousand people were present.

Two Brothers Shot.

Stockton, Cal., Nov. 7.—Louis Raggio and John Raggio, 14 and 12 years old, were shot by Robert Benson, aged 15, yesterday. Louis died this morning, but John will probably live a few hours. The Raggio boys taunted Benson about his marksmanship. Benson reached for a cartridge, slipped it into his gun and fired point blank. Both boys dropped. Benson was arrested, and made the statement that he thought the cartridge a blank one.

Sails for Home.

Lenox, Mass., Nov. 6.—Two telegrams from Commander R. E. Peary were received here today by Morris K. Jessup, president of the Peary Arctic Club, stating that the explorer had obtained coal at Battle Harbor, N. F., but was delayed by gales. He hoped to sail today.
