NEW FIRE ALARM SYSTEM

Salem Will Have Little Automatic Guardians On Watch

When the State Agent company, under the local agency of E. B. Gamble, complete the installation of the automatic fire alarm system Salem will have been provided with one of the best protections against a serious outbreak of fire of any city on the Pacific coast. Good progress is being made in the stringing of wires and the making of preparations for the setting of public break-the-glass fire alarm boxes and Mr. Gamble hopes to have the system ready for practical operation before the first of the year. Besides the public boxes nearly every business house in the city will have been supplied with private automatic fire alarms as a consequence of which the fire insurance rates will have been reduced to an extent sufficient to more than off-set the cost of the service.

Under the contract or agreement by which the system is to be installed the company will provide 15 public alarm boxes but two extra ones have already been ordered since the council ordered the system installed and it quite probable that at least twenty or thirty more boxes will be placed when other loops, which are now under consideration, are built. The fifteen boxes will be located, according to the present

plans, as follows: Corner of Commercial and High streets, Commercial and State, Liberty and Ferry, Church and Ferry, High and State, Liberty and Court, Chemeketa and Commercial, Chemeketa and Summer, Chemeketa and Fourteenth, Liberty and Center, Marlon and High, Commercial and Division, Mission and Twelfth.

When the South Salem loop of wire is strung, which will be a mile in length more than a score of private and public boxes and thermostats will be connected, and there is scarcely a question of doubt that the state will order the system installed in the asylum, penitentiary and blind school and a separate loop will have to be provided for these accommodations.

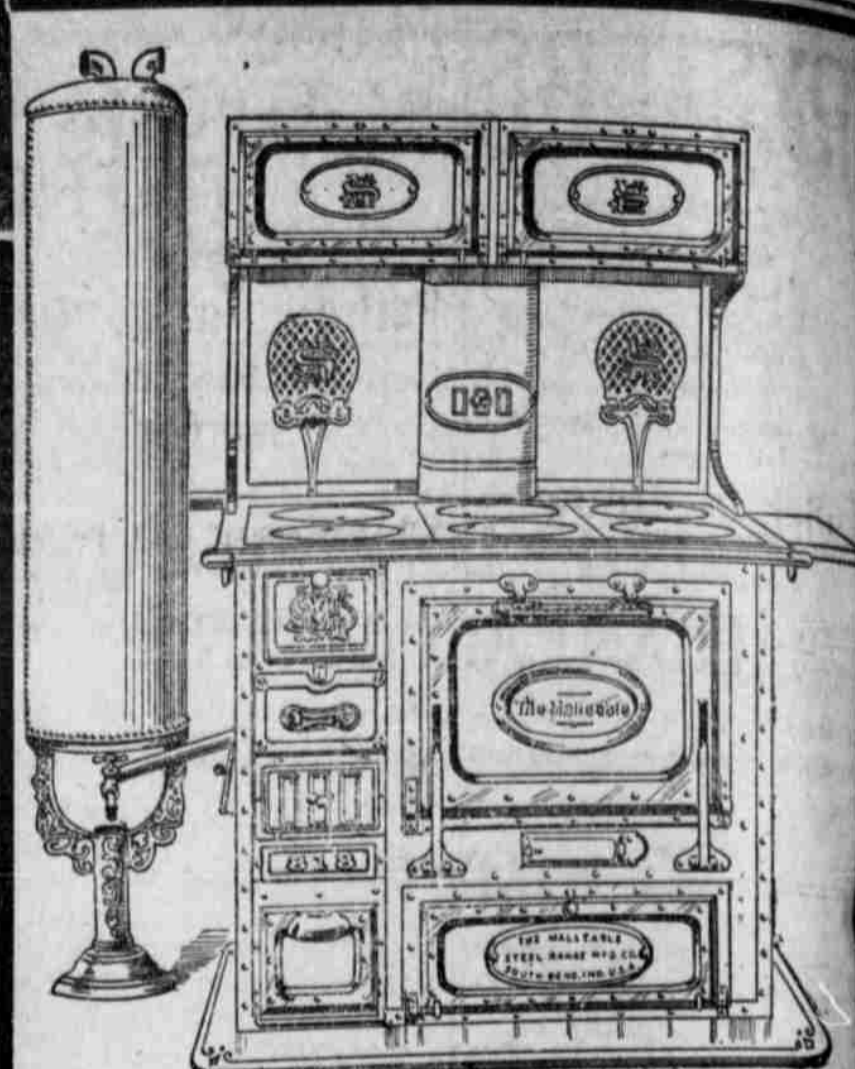
The thermostat fire alarm system is adapted to any and all kinds of protection against loss of life or property by this element since it is regulated solely by the action of the temperature and so delicate and sensitive are the workings of the simple little instrument, which consists only of a small metal case and a highly sensitized composition metal bar which expands and contracts accurately and without failure with every degree of heat and cold, that failure to turn in an alarm is a practical impossibility.

The headquarters of the State Agent company, which have been established on Liberty street between Court and Chemeketa, are equipped with every style of instrument and device to which the simple yet impressive and mysterious little piece of machinery can be attached or applied and the uses to which it can be adapted are simply marvelous. When the city alarm system has been completed every box and private alarm will be connected directly with the fire department and, through a regu-

lar system of signals and numbers, when an alarm is turned in it will be possible for the department to know upon the instant the exact location of the conflagration and can respond to the call without a moment's delay.

Every instrument will be also connected with the fire bell which is now located in the tower of the city hall but the bell, the tones of which are now muffled on account of being confined to the tower, will be taken out and placed upon a high platform tower in order that there will be no obstruction whatever to the vibrations. When an alarm is turned in from one of the public boxes the signal will be repeated four distinct times on the big fire bell and when an alarm comes in from one of the private thermostats the alarm will continue to sound until the department arrives and disconnects the instrument.

The instruments can be set to any degree of temperature and when the heat or cold arrives at a degree above or below the limit the sensitive metal bar moves over to one side of the other until an electrical connection is made and the current does the rest. There is a thousand and one uses to which the little device can be put among the most important of which is its attachment to the sprinkling system, especially adapted to woodwork establishment, factories, etc., to regulate the water supply of boilers to prevent explosions; brick kiln thermostats and dial to register the temperature on the inside at all times, a great fuel saver and maker of a better quality of brick; and a special round style of thermostat made especially for vessels to be used in the hold and among the cargo to warn the ship's officers that a fire is imminent from spontaneous combustion and other-

wise and they all work upon the same system and are alike serviceable and indispensable.

Another highly important use to which the almost human device will be put before another year rolls around will be its attachment to hop and prune kilns where it will be in a position to save the farmers thousands of dollars in possible loss from fire. A portable hop kiln, built upon scientific lines but small scale, has been constructed and it will be taken around through the country to give the hop growers a practical illustration of its usefulness. It can also be used to great advantage in hotels where a thermostat can be placed in every room and department in the building and connected with the office annunciator so that, in case fire breaks out any place in the building the office force will be able to locate it on the instant and quench the flames before they have been able to gain any headway, to say nothing about protecting the lives of the guests.

Delegates Appointed.

The following list of delegates were appointed by Governor Chamberlain this morning to represent the state at the National Rivers and Harbors Congress convention, to be held at Washington, D. C., December 6 and 7, of the present year: J. N. Teal, L. A. Lewis, Henry Hahn, W. A. Wheelwright, R. R. Hoge and J. A. Smith, of Portland; J. D. Peters, The Dalles; John H. Smith, Astoria, and Peter Loggie, Marshfield. The governor has also notified the congressional representatives of the convention, and requests that they attend the same in the interests of the state.

WILL BUILD THE ROAD.

Right of Way for Road to Portland Has Been Secured.

Hon. John B. Ryan, one of the attorneys for the company that proposes to construct an electric line from this city to the metropolis in the city. Mr. Ryan has charge of securing the right of way. During the past month Mr. Ryan has secured a right of way from the Willamette river to Wilhoit Springs, the Molalla river.

As the capital behind the enterprise is the same that controls the line from Portland to Canemah south of Oregon City, the line will only have to be built from Salem to that point to make the connection.

Mr. Ryan says that he is informed by the interests behind him that the portion of the road between Salem and Canemah will be built first, and then the branch line will be run to the Molalla river.

As a matter of fact, work on the road will have to be commenced before next July or the deeds to the right of way may be forfeited.
