ANOTHER WEEK'S VACATION

The legislature has set up a state educational machine that towers over the public school system, which becomes a mere annex of the machine.

The past week the schools were disposed of for nearly the whole week, to enable all the teachers to attend the institute.

Fifteen hundred children in this city were at home or running the streets while all the teachers of the county were required to attend.

To say nothing of what it costs the teachers to leave home and attend these institutes, the parents suffered inconvenience and loss by it.

The children having been fitted up with clothes and books and taken from other tasks are supposed to be in school for the whole term.

It costs about two hundred dollars a day to run the Salem schools, and all this expense goes right on while the schools are dismissed by law.

Another bad feature of the legislature is the requirement for state teachers associations during school terms. The result is more vacations.

The school boards are asked to close the public schools for all the week of Thanksgiving, for teachers' association at Portland three days.

Now there is not much excuse to take another week of the time of the schools of this city this month, and it is to be hoped it will not be done.

The poorer people do not care much about county institutes or state associations, and the state school law should have some regard for their rights.

ENGINEER DONALD HELD UP

Portland Highwayman Makes
Victim of Engineer of Salem
Portland Road

R. L. Donald, the chief engineer of the Oregon Electric Company, who is well-known in Salem, and who has spent most of his time in this city since the beginning of construction work on the Salem and Portland line, was held up and robbed Saturday night in Portland. The Portland Journal tells the story as follows:

"Hands up! Don't make any fuss and you won't get hurt. All I want is your money—and diamonds, if you have any. Turn your face to the hedge and stand still."

With these words a man stepped from the shadows at the southeast corner of Tenth and Montgomery streets last night and confronted R. L. Donald, at the same time extending his right hand, from which gleamed the shining barrel of a small revolver.

Mrs. Donald was there, too. But she did not scream.

"Do exactly as he tells you," she said to her husband.

Donald is a civil engineer engaged in the construction of the electric railroad between Portland and Salem. He resides with his wife at 466 Tenth street, and the couple were strolling in the direction of the Montgomery street car line at 8:45 o'clock when the man with the shining revolver stepped from the shadows.

Mr. Donald did as he was commanded by the robber—and by his wife. Holding his hands above his head he faced the hedge, while Mrs. Donald stood nearby.

The highwayman, a small man without any mask save the powder sprinkled on his face by a barber, who had evidently served him less than an hour before, placed the muzzle of his weapon against the back of his victim and went through his pockets from behind. Five dollars and a half were taken from a trousers pocket and a gold watch and chain were slipped from their fastenings and found their way into the robber's jeans. Then the highwayman abstracted a pocketbook from the inside of Donald's coat and fumbled in it for a moment. He did not find anything, and here Mrs. Donald came to his assistance for the second time. Taking the purse from the robber's hands she quickly found the two \$10 bills contained therein, and graciously turned them over to him, restoring the leather to her husband.

"Got any diamonds?"

"No."

"He's gone. Oh, I'm so glad you didn't make him angry," breathed Mrs. Donald, and the husband turned to see the stranger hurrying south on Tenth street.

"If I'd had a gun I could have plugged him," said Donald. But Donald didn't have the gun. So he telephoned to Captain Bruin, head of the police detectives.

Bruin was still on the spot taking notes. Donald describes his man as being small, about 33 years of age, smooth shaven and wearing a light overcoat and soft hat. Believing that he could identify the criminal on sight, he volunteered to spend the rest of the evening traveling around with Captain Bruin looking for him. "No no he'll recognize you and shoot you," objected Mrs. Donald at first. Then she relented.

"Take me home first, anyhow, and make sure that the hateful thing isn't there," she said.

About an hour after the robbery Donald told the police that he had \$300 in bills in a pocket that the robber had neglected to search.

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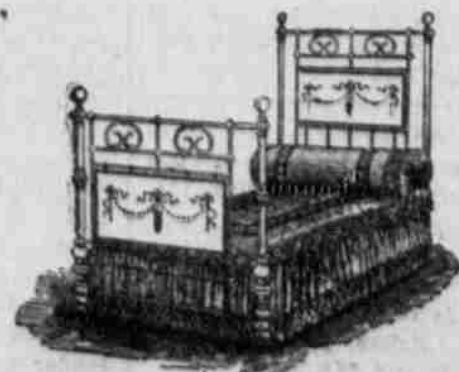
