Salem Business Men Interested in Alaska Mining Properties

"Oregon goods for Oregon institutions," is the slogan that has been adopted by the Oregon-Susitna Mining Company, at the regular annual meeting of the stockholders, held in this city last evening, and, suiting the action to the word, an order has been placed with the Marine Iron Works, of Portland, for over 1000 feet of 14-inch piping, which will be used in the development of its immense placer gold claims, on the Susitna river, in Alaska, by hydraulic pressure. Had it been possible, the company would have purchased its hydraulic giant in Portland also, but, unfortunately, such Alaska mining supplies are not kept in stock by Portland supply firms, and Dan S. Kain, discoverer of the rich deposit, and one of the principal stockholders, will leave for San Francisco today to purchase one.

The Oregon-Susitna Mining Company, which is purely an Oregon institution, all of the stock having been taken up by Portland and Salem capital, owns about 20 acres of the richest bed of placer deposit in Alaska, and so well pleased are the stockholders with the results obtained by this year's workings, with shovel and pan, as is evidenced by the \$2292 worth of gold dust and nuggets brought out by Mr. Kain, and now on exhibition in the show window of a local business establishment, which is only a portion of the clean-up, that they decided at yesterday afternoon's meeting to develop the property upon a large scale, and by the hydraulic system. To do this, cost of materials, freight, etc., will entail an aggregate expense of over \$10,000 to put the plant in readiness for operation, and all the necessary materials, including piping, etc., and all provisions will be purchased in Portland, and shipped direct to Valdez.

The mining property is located 250 miles in the interior from Valdez seaport, and it will cost an immense sum of money to have the material sledged inland. To bring water to the claims in sufficient quantity and pressure will require the digging of a ditch and building of a flume 300 feet in length and over 1000 feet of piping. This will give a pressure, through a 6-inch giant nozzle, sufficient to tear down the side of a mountain. The pipe alone will weigh 55 pounds to the foot, and the order is subject to shipment by December 15th.

Mr. Kain, and perhaps one or two others of the stockholders, expect to leave Portland for Alaska about that time, in order to arrive in Valdez on or before January 1st, prepared for an early start into the interior. The stockholders compose Drs. Williamson and W. D. McNary, of Portland; John Carson, John Sweeney, Dr. A. B. Gillis, Louis Lachmund, Julius Pincus, J. P. Rogers, of Salem, and J. N. Lathrop, of Valdez, Alaska. It was decided at the meeting that no stock would be placed on the market, but that all would be taken up at par by the original promoters. Mr. Kain will go to San Francisco from Portland by steamer, and expects to return about the middle of next month. The company will also purchase all of its horses in Portland or the valley.

RESOLUTION TO IMPROVE STATE STREET.

Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the Council of the City of Salem, held Monday, November 5, 1906, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient and proposes to improve State street from the east line of Commercial street to the west line of Church street in the following manner, to-wit:

First—By taking up the artificial stone cross walks.
Second—By grading the roadway from the east line of Commercial street to the west line of High street a width of thirty and one-half feet on each side of the center line of the street, and from the east line of High street to the west line of Church street the space between the curbs as they are now in place, and the full intersection of Liberty street and High street to the proper sub-grade.

Third—By paving the roadway and full intersections, save and except the space between the rails and one foot outside of the rails of the street railway tracks with Warren's Bitulithic Water Proof Pavement.

Fourth—By paving the space between the rails of the railway tracks and one foot outside of the track, belonging to the Portland General Electric R. R. Co., and Oregon Electric R. R. Co., with stones and blocks set on concrete and grouted with cement mortar and by replacing the rails now in use with grooved rails not less than seven inches in depth and weighing not less than seventy-five (75) pounds per yard. The concrete under the rails and stone blocks to be not less than six inches in depth.

Fifth—By constructing artificial stone curbs on each side of the street from the east line of Commercial street to the center line of High street, thirty-one and one-half feet from the center line of the street, and joining the curb with those now in place on Liberty street and High street, and by constructing artificial stone sidewalks over the space between the curbs now in place and the proposed new curb, and on other portions of the sidewalk area not now paved with artificial stone sidewalk.

Sixth—By constructing an inlet for the water at the northeast corner of the intersection of State street with High street and a catch basin at the northwest corner, and connecting the inlet and catch basin with six-inch vitrified sewer pipe, and connecting the catch basin with the sewer with six-inch sewer pipe.

Resolved, That the Recorder of the City of Salem be and is hereby directed to give notice of the proposed improvement of said street, as provided by the City Charter.

Remonstrances against the above improvement may be filed in writing with the City Recorder within ten days from the final publication of this notice.
