### November Sunset.

Sunset Magazine maintains its claim as the magazine of the Pacific coast by the high order of excellence of its November number. Its artistic cover depicting the bronze statue of "The Coming of the White Man," which stands in the Portland city park. Geographically its papers illustrate Oregon, California, Arizona, New Mexico, Mexico and the Philippines. Its subjects range from natural scenery, the development of communities and architecture, mining and dairying to Rugby football and sailing, and its writers all know their subjects.

The adoption of Rugby football by the Universities of California and Stanford lend especial value to two timely and practical papers by Oscar N. Taylor and James Lanagan, the coaches of these two university teams. G. A. White writes forcibly of "Oregon Outlook," and the paper is illustrated by some fine photographs of striking scenery, while G. L. Kay, professor of dairying in the Iowa state college, writes ably and with judgment on Oregon's dairying and points out the needs and the opportunities of this great industry. Bertha C. Crowell, in the "White Sands of New Mexico," and Arthur North in "The Norther of California," describes little known but picturesque regions. Mr. North has thoroughly explored Baja, or Lower California, and is conversant with its interesting history.

In a paper on "Philippine Prospects," Hamilton Wright shows how the wise and patient American administration of the islands has secured and broadly laid the foundations for the development of their industries and commerce as well as the native peoples themselves. The construction of railroads and other public works, the rapid extension of public education and the progress made in agriculture and commercial interests, under the protection of a strong government, all point to a remarkable prosperity for our oriental wards. This situation offers great opportunities in the islands for young men, which the writer forcibly and clearly points out.

One of the strongest papers in this number is that on "The California Country House," by Herbert D. Croly, editor of the New York Architectural Record, profusely illustrated by appropriate photographs. The views of such a recognized expert cannot fail to be read with much interest and appreciation, certainly by everyone who would build a house

on the Pacific coast. A. W. Moon describes "Astoria's Odd Festival," a regatta at the close of the Columbia fishing season, and pictures it attractively.

Berkeley is so well known as the site of the University of California that it will surprise many readers to learn that it is not only a scholastic but a great commercial center. Warren Cheney sets forth the facts of the rapid commercial development of the east shore of San Francisco bay of late years, and these facts are worth reading and considering.

There are good stories by E. Allen Phillips and Adeline Knapp and good poems by Theresa Russell, Amelia Truesdell, Curtis Page and Elwyn Hoffman. Altogether the number is a strong and readable one.

## WAS NOT WITH D'ANNA

Editor of the Capital Journal:

In yesterday's issue of your paper you left with the general public the inference that I was in the company of D'Anna on the night preceding the tragedy. That inference is absolutely false, and without sufficient excuse; and there is no justification for its having appeared in your paper.

At no time during that night or the next morning was I with D'Anna. I did see him in the White House restaurant, but I was not in his company, and did not even speak to him while in the restaurant. I saw some persons whom I afterwards learned had been injured in a runaway go into the restaurant. The man was covered with mud, and was bleeding, and I went in to learn of the trouble and the extent of the man's injuries. D'Anna went into the restaurant at the same time I did, but he was not in my company.

Mr. D'Anna and I were on friendly terms, as passing acquaintances. I was never in my life in his company, excepting by chance meeting, never went with him to any place, and knew him only as I know hundreds of other men. Again, when I saw D'Anna he was not drunk, and it would have taken a very close observer, if unacquainted with him, to have noticed at that time that he was under the influence of liquor.

It appears to me this sensational case has brought enough trouble and humiliation to those who were concerned, either directly or indirectly in the tragedy, without connecting with it any person who is in nowise contributed to it.

### Progress in San Francisco.

The Merchants' association of San Francisco, always an active factor for civic advancement and improvement recently held a reconstruction dinner in St. Francis hotel. The following quotation from the Association Review will give some idea of the spirit manifested at this meeting:

"Amid the ruins of the old San Francisco, the Merchants' association has pledged itself to render all the service in its power toward the

upbuilding of the new and greater city. Without time to regret the past, and with no misgivings for the future, 275 representatives of the mercantile community sat down to dine in the center of the burned area on July 25, just 98 days after the fire, and for two hours endorsed with applause and cheers every declaration, by eloquent speakers, of devotion to the city's interests and confidence in its early restoration.

"Over a hundred more wanted to come, sent their checks for seats. One merchant wanted tickets for all heads of departments in his store. But the banquet hall would not seat another man and to the great regret of the association's officers, applications coming later than a few hours after the first announcement had to be declined.

"It was the most successful gathering in the history of the association. In the enthusiasm generated, in the expressions of loyalty to the city, and determination to hold it to its rightful rank and importance, in the mutual encouragement derived from the first reunion, since the fire, of men with a common purpose and, resolution, the psychological value of the event was inestimable; while the evidence of harmony between the association and the head of the city government promised an era of good will and co-operation.

"The setting was unique. The scene was the famous White and Gold room of the St. Francis hotel, its once brilliant decorations reduced to evenly-blended shades of gray. Saw-dust covered the broken floor, rough lumber at the window openings walled out the night, and the skeletons of the once dazzling chandeliers were strung with spidery wiring for the temporary lights. On the walls that had carried the dainty gold and white decorations, patches of calcined marble clung to the grey brick, while the gun steel columns, once beautiful with artistic tracery in gold-leaf, stood sheathed in ashen-hued concrete.

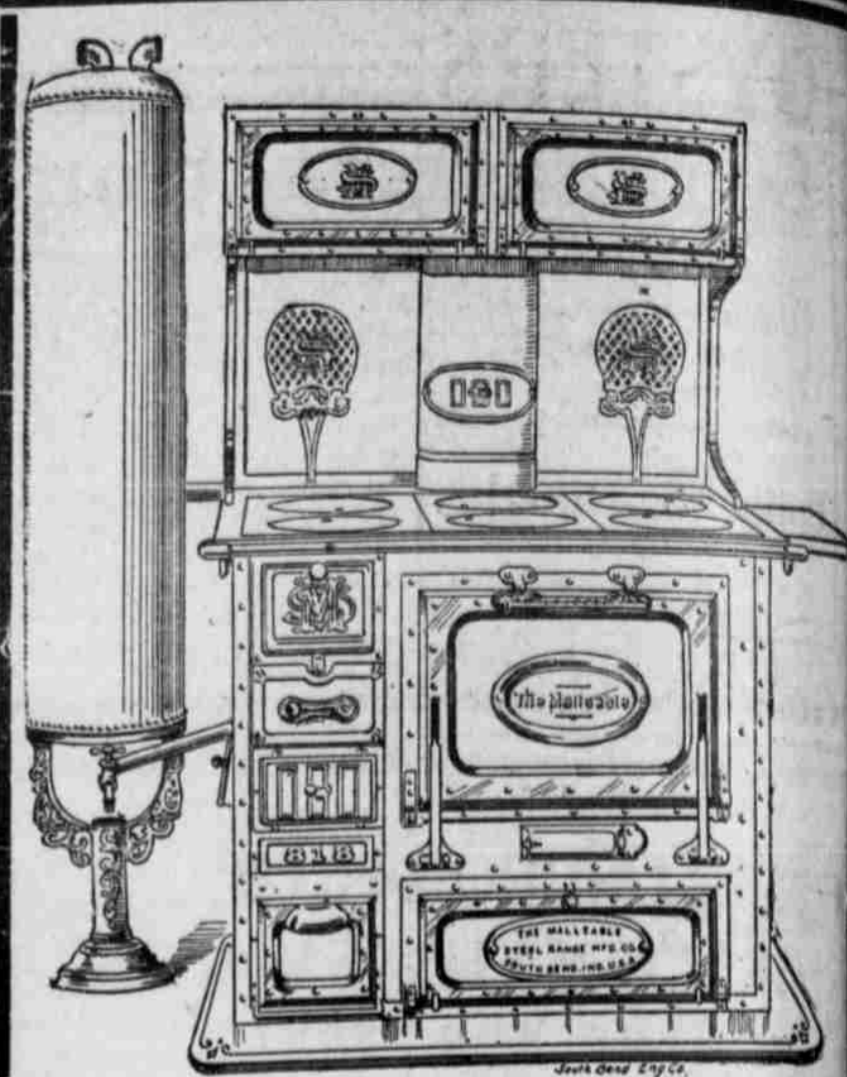
"The tables were decorated with burned silverware—forks, spoons, butter-knives, wine coolers and punch bowls—and the hotel invited the guests to take the pieces away as souvenirs. The menu cards had been appropriately 'fired,' so that they resembled the contents of a newly-opened safe in the burned district. Over the speakers' table was the flag that floated from the San Francisco building at the St. Louis exposition—a piece of white bunting bearing, prophetically, a phoenix rising from the flames, with the Spanish motto: 'Oro in Pax, Fierro en Guerra.' The flag was burned through here and there. It had gone through the fire in the vaults of the association's offices."

### Child Labor—A National Shame.

H. G. Wells, the interesting Englishman, who has been among us taking notes, speaks of our use of child energy as "the weakest spot in America's fine front of national well-being." And he writes with abhorrence of nocturnal child employment. "Just think of it!" he cries with pained astonishment. "The richest, greatest country the world has ever seen has over 1,700,000 children under 15 years of age toiling in fields, factories, mines and workshops. He points out that there are not less than 80,000 children, most of whom are girls, at present employed in the textile mills of the country. In the south, he affirms, there are now six times as many children at work as there were twenty years ago.

Mr. Raymond Patterson has been making a personal investigation of child labor, visiting them as they toil in the hideous heat of the glass-blowing furnace rooms; in the damp darkness of the coal mines; the slime and reek of the stockyards; the dull monotony of the tenements, underground and otherwise, where the sweatshop sewing is done. The tale he has to tell is a terrible one; made three times more terrible by the fact that in not a few cases a family is partly or entirely dependent on the labor of some child, who, realizing this, carries, consciously, his burden of responsibility. He tells of one boy who, being fearfully injured, was taken to the hospital, and when he saw his mother's tears, fancied them shed because the family would be kept out of his pitiful wretched wage.—Reader.
