Friday the Portland High school football team comes to Salem to have a scrimmage on the gridiron with the Willamette Juniors. They have played one game together already this year at Portland where P. H. S. was victorious with a score of 6 to 0. Portland expects to win this game with even a larger score than in the other game, and the Juniors expect just as much to win it themselves and even up for their previous defeat.

The Juniors defeated Salem High school last Friday by a score of 7 to 0 and this has made them confident they can win the Portland High school game.

Willamette at Portland.

Next Saturday the Willamette varsity goes to Portland to have their annual game with the Multnomah Athletic club. Last year Willamette won this game by a score of 4 to 0 and owing to this fact the game Saturday will be exceptionally interesting as M. A. A. C. will do all in their power to win back their lost honors.

Last Saturday Willamette played U. of W. at Seattle, the score resulting in 0 to 0.

Willamette is playing much better ball than when they were defeated by Whitman and it is not unlikely they will win this game from Multnomah. They expect to have Coleman back in his old place for this game, which will greatly strengthen the team.

Quite a number of Salemites will go to Portland to witness the struggle and cheer the team on to victory.

Little Ragged Shoes.

Daniel Stephenson, a bridge carpenter, arrested on complaint of Wm. Armstrong, the veteran shoemaker last Saturday on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon was yesterday bound over to appear in circuit court.

The case was called by Justice Webster yesterday at 2 p. m. and the evidence of Mr. Armstrong and the defendant taken, they being the only witnesses to the affair.

The plaintiff testified that the defendant brought to him a pair of shoes to be repaired. The work was done and a charge of 50 cents was made by the plaintiff which was paid.

The defendant then, according to Mr. Armstrong's testimony, left another pair of shoes, which were to be repaired and when the defendant came for them he paid the charge, of one dollar, took the shoes and left the shop. "In about 15 minutes," said the complaining witness, "the man came back and used abusive language, picking up a club he demanded that I should return the one dollar, which he claimed belonged to him as he had paid at the time of leaving the shoes."

Mr. Armstrong returned the dollar and the defendant went his way.

According to the defendant's testimony the one dollar was paid at the time the shoes were left and that when he paid the second time he had paid twice. He therefore returned and requested the plaintiff to return the money which he did—but he stated that he had on intention of striking "the old man."

The court held that in as much as the defendant took the dollar from the plaintiff under the circumstances whether it belonged to him or not was an act of robbery and placed the said defendant under bail of \$250 to appear in circuit court.

Henry Turner appeared for the defendant while Walter Keys was counsel for the plaintiff.

RESOLUTION TO IMPROVE STATE STREET.

Notice is hereby given that at the meeting of the Council of the City of Salem, held Monday, November 5, 1906, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Council of the City of Salem, Oregon, deems it expedient and proposes to improve State street from the east line of Commercial street to the west line of Church street in the following manner, to-wit:

First—By taking up the artificial stone cross walks.

Second—By grading the roadway from the east line of Commercial street to the west line of High street a width of thirty and one-half feet on each side of the center line of the street, and from the east line of High street to the west line of Church street the space between the curbs as they are now in place, and the full intersection of Liberty street and High street to the proper sub-grade.

Third—By paving the roadway and full intersections, save and except the space between the rails and one foot outside of the rails of the street railway tracks with Warren's Bitulithic Water Proof Pavement.

Fourth—By paving the space between the rails of the railway tracks and one foot outside of the track, belonging to the Portland General Electric R. R. Co., and Oregon Electric R. R. Co., with stones and blocks set on concrete and grouted with cement mortar and by replacing the rails now in use with grooved rails not less than seven inches in depth and weighing not less than seventy-five (75) pounds per yard. The concrete under the rails and stone blocks to be not less than six inches in depth.

Fifth—By constructing artificial stone curbs on each side of the street from the east line of Commercial street to the center line of High street, thirty-one and one-half feet from the center line of the street, and joining the curb with those now in place on Liberty street and High street, and by constructing artificial stone sidewalks over the space between the curbs now in place and the proposed new curb, and on other portions of the sidewalk area not now paved with artificial stone sidewalk.

Sixth—By constructing an inlet for the water at the northeast corner of the intersection of State street with High street and a catch basin at the northwest corner, and connecting the inlet and catch basin with six-inch vitrified sewer pipe, and connecting the catch basin with the sewer with six-inch sewer pipe.

The plans, specifications and estimates of the engineer employed by the Council for the improvement of said State street are hereby adopted. Resolved, That the Recorder of the City of Salem be and is hereby directed to give notice of the proposed improvement of said street, as provided by the City Charter.

Remonstrances against the above improvement may be filed in writing with the City Recorder within ten days from the final publication of this notice.
