

ILLIHEE CLUB MOVES

Is Now at Home on Lower Floor of the Elegant New Elks Building

The only discordant feature which characterized the first annual meeting of the Illihee Club held in the new quarters in the new Elks' building, which took place last evening, was the introduction of a resolution by A. N. Gilbert which provided for the selection of a committee of three members to be known as the nomination committee, the duties of which would be to post on the club bulletin board, 30 days before the annual election, the names of three candidates for the offices of president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer, and ten names of candidates for the office of trustees. Otherwise the annual election of officers and other business was passed over smoothly and harmoniously, but the resolution, after considerable discussion and debate, was finally tabled, and will be carried over to the next annual meeting.

Although not yet completely furnished and decorated, the rooms to be occupied by the Illihee Club were tastefully arranged for the first meeting, and there was a large gathering of members in attendance. Practically the only contest for office was that of the presidency, which dwindled down to a choice between the retiring presiding officer, John A. Carson, and Dr. L. F. Griffith, first assistant physician at the insane asylum, the result of which was the re-election of President Carson by a vote of 43 to 37. Vice-President Werner Breyman, who has held the office for a number of years, was honored with a re-election without opposition, as was also Secretary Frank Meredith, who has officiated in that capacity for the past three terms. The board of trustees, as elected, is composed of Messrs. Paul Wallace, Louis Lachmund, J. R. Linn, Frank Hughes and W. H. Eldridge.

It was also decided, according to custom, to reduce the initiation fee from \$25 to \$10 until the first of the year, a special dispensation provided for by the club constitution, after which the old rates will be resumed, and will prevail during the balance of the ensuing year. It was also decided, according to custom, that the club will act as host to the members of the forthcoming legislature, their friends and families, and tender them a cordial reception during the early part of the session. Upon motion President Carson appointed a committee composed of Messrs. Squire Farrar, chairman; A. N. Gilbert, H. D. Patton, A. N. Moores and Fred Thielsen, on reception and arrangement for the occasion, and the entire club will be left in this committee's hands.

The club, which moved from its old quarters on Commercial street, only last week, occupies the entire first floor of the beautiful new Elks' building on Liberty street, between Court and Chemeketa, and the rooms will be fitted up in grand and comfortable style when completely furnished, affording the most inviting and artistic club rooms existing on the coast. The reports of the different officers show that the membership is steadily on the increase, and that the club has a goodly credit after all the claims are satisfied. Every department is being conducted upon a cash and profitable basis.

Should Protect the Bridge.

Editor Journal:—The sudden rise of the Santiam and other rivers is playing great havoc with the railroad and wagon bridges throughout the valley. Many are weakened, some battered down and out by the heavy drift and others rendered unsafe without the slightest evidence to warn the passing public.

During last summer hundreds of tons of rock should have been dumped in front of the piers, thus giving the bridge a good substantial protection from the enormous drift sure to follow a rise in the mountain feeders. Why have not the guardians of this valuable avenue of trade and commerce to Salem merchants seen to this matter? The great, costly structure is fathered by Polk and Marion counties and the city of Salem, and those authorities should get together and make some special effort to prevent any damage coming to this bridge this winter. PENDLETON'S GOOD STREETS.

Judge Halley Much Pleased With the Thoroughfares in Umatilla's Capital.

"Pendleton is building splendid streets," said Judge Thomas G. Halley, on his return from Eastern Oregon yesterday. "The main street from the railroad to the Umatilla river is paved all the way, and a large section of Court street is also completed. These streets are being paved with bitulithic pavement, and are giving good satisfaction."

In addition to this a half mile of model road is being built on the road out of Pendleton to Weston, Milton and Athena. This is similar to the mile out near the Fair Grounds in Salem. These improvements add very much to the appearance and comfort of Pendleton."

Judge Halley says that the work on the Umatilla Irrigation project is moving rapidly ahead, and that its good influence is already felt.

"Tibet the Mysterious."

New York, Nov. 14.—The long expected work of Sir Henry Holdich on "Tibet the Mysterious" was issued by the Frederick A. Stokes company today. Sir Henry gives a full history of the attempts, successful and unsuccessful, to penetrate and explore the country from the earliest times down to the present day and also give a full description of the present situation there. The invasion of the country by English troops under Col. Younghusband and the work of the British "mission" there are fully discussed and throw a new light on the subject.

International Tuberculosis Meeting.

New York, Nov. 14.—There were delegates from all parts of the world at the International Tuberculosis convention which commenced its proceedings today here and every state and section of a state in the union was represented. There were general discussions on the whole problem of tuberculosis and an influential committee was appointed for the purpose of urging preventative legislation and the establishment of government and municipal sanitariums to assist in fighting the disease. the counties or the city, but the loss of this bridgewould be felt not only in a financial way, but in a great loss to the merchants of this city. It would be policy for the merchants to make a demand that something be done to protect this greatest avenue to their business. The counties and the city could very easily have contributed their respective third of the expense and have had plenty of heavy rock and gravel placed in front of these piers and saved any possible undermining during the coming high water.

A bridge built on the plan of this bridge is never safe owing to its excessive height and narrowness. Wider apart piers would help matters materially but that is too late now to consider. If the water can knock out railroad bridges, all of which are certainly built with every precaution to high water, what can municipalities expect from their bridges? A little foresight might save our big bridge from wreck. The incoming drift comprised of immense logs and trees would strike with their tons and tons of force the bulkheads of rock and gravel and be deflected from a direct blow on their pier itself. Why do the merchants not call the attention of the proper authorities to this matter in the shape of an earnest demand for an immediate safeguard to this valuable channel of business?

Board Cancelled Certificates.

At its meeting yesterday afternoon the State Land Board cancelled 329 certificates for the purchase of school lands, being all the certificates that were acknowledged before H. H. Turner. In most of these cases the greater part of the claims of the State has been paid, and there is no law permitting the Land Board to repay this. The purchaser will have to lose the amount paid unless the matter is remedied by an act of the legislature.

Dangerous Shafts to Be Closed.

Topeka, Kan., Nov. 14.—Owing to the great danger to both human and animal life caused by the abandoned shafts in the Kansas and Missouri zinc fields steps will immediately be taken to have them closed up. In some parts of this state there are acres in extent where the shafts are not more than 20 feet apart, and owing to the way they are covered with grass, weeds and shrubs are extremely dangerous to life. As the laws of the state demand it public sentiment will compel the officials to do their duty and order the owners of the property to close up the shafts. It is generally believed in this state that horses and cattle advertised as stolen have been lost in the shafts and the opinion is also prevalent that a very large number of persons who have been described from time to time as "missing" met with their deaths in them, as the two states are honey-combed with them in several places.
