AURORA'S WATER SUPPLY

Aurora, Ore., Nov. 15.—At the
meeting of the city council
ordinance was passed authorizing
the mayor and recorder to enter
into a contract with D. M. Watson,
Portland, to bore an eight inch
well deep enough to get a sufficient
supply of water for a city water
works plant. The price was to be
\$75 per foot for the eight inch
pipe, \$3.75 for six inch pipe, and \$3
for 4 1/2 inch pipe, if it was found
necessary to use the smaller sizes.
A letter to the council in August
by D. M. Watson agreed, in case the
council accepted his proposition and
made a contract with him, that he
would start work on the plant with-
in thirty or forty days. After the
finance was passed the recorder re-
ceived a letter from Mr. Watson,
who was in Illinois at the time, say-
ing that his boring outfit was work-
ing on a plant at Astoria (and that
it would get around to the Aurora
as soon as possible. This was
over a month ago, and none of the
officials have since heard from
the contractor, and the citizens are
beginning to wonder where they are
on the water works proposition.
Representative of the Fairbanks
people was here today Sgur-
with the city council in regard
to laying the water works mains.
Mr. Watson is merely a letter from
him telling what he would do, and
there is no time limit or penalty at-
tached.

A water works plant is needed
as the insurance rates are near-
prohibitive, and the city has mon-
ey enough in the treasury to build
the plant without bonding the city.

Enough revenue could be obtained
from water users to make the plant
pay out in a short time.

**TO JOIN
FRISCO TO
GOTHAM**

WASHINGTON LEARNS OF ES-
TABLISHMENT OF FLEET OF
FOURTEEN VESSELS TO PLY
BETWEEN HONOLULU AND
AND NEW YORK AND SAN
FRANCISCO AND NEW YORK,
VIA THE ISTHMUS OF TEHAUN-
TEPEC—FACT TAKEN AS
PROOF THAT THE ERA OF
WATER TRANSPORTATION HAS
REALLY DAWNED.

Washington, Nov. 15.—Word of
what is regarded as the first im-
portant step taken in anticipation of
the opening of the Panama canal,
reached Washington this week from
Mexico City. According to advices
the American-Hawaiian Steamship
company will put in operation in
January a fleet of fourteen big
freight steamers between New York
and San Francisco and New York
and Honolulu, in connection with the
Tehuantepec National railway of
Mexico, which traverses the Isthmus
of Tehuantepec. It is believed that
the steamships will run direct from
coast to coast as soon as the Pana-
ma canal is opened, and that the
company is starting this early in or-
der to establish its business.

The fleet of fourteen ships is to di-
vided, seven of them plying between
New York and Coahuacillas, and an
equal number between San Francis-
co, Santa Cruz and Honolulu. The
steamers will maintain a weekly
schedule, and freight will be trans-
shipped across the Isthmus by rail.

The news is regarded here as most
important to all sections of the coun-
try, for it goes to prove that an era
of water transportation is at hand
and the domination of the railroads
in commerce thus is to be curbed
naturally. Delegates from both the
Atlantic and Pacific coasts to the
convention of the national rivers
and harbor congress here December
6 and 7 next will explain fully at that
time just what further plans are
making for an extension of this
water traffic from coast to coast. It
is reported that many big projects
are under way.

Incidentally, the convention will
dwell on the need for more vigorous
action all along the line in the mat-
ter of waterway development. The
rivers and harbors of the country are
said to be the most disgraceful of
any nation, and in the interests of
commerce demands will be made
that the appropriation for the devel-
opment of natural resources be in-
creased to \$50,000,000 annually.
The rivers and harbors congress is
non-political and its appeal is ex-
pected to have weight with the na-
tional lawmakers at the coming ses-
sion.

Among other things, the conven-
tion will point out that if the United
States is to capture the trade of
South and Central America, it must
improve its ports and navigable
rivers. In addition, the establish-
ment of sea-going lines would be of
far greater benefit if the steamships
were able to ascend streams toward
the interior of the country, thus
bringing transportation charges down
to a minimum and enabling the
American manufacturer, merchant
and farmer to compete with their
rivals in other nations who have cap-
tured and hold the trade of Latin
America solely because they have
been able to ship entirely by water.

**RESOLUTION TO IMPROVE
STATE STREET.**

Notice is hereby given that at the
meeting of the Council of the City
of Salem, held Monday, November 5,
1906, the following resolution was
adopted:

Resolved, That the Council of the
City of Salem, Oregon, deems it ex-
pedient and proposes to improve
State street from the east line of
Commercial street to the west line of
Church street in the following man-
ner, to-wit:

First—By taking up the artificial
stone cross walks.

Second—By grading the roadway
from the east line of Commercial
street to the west line of High
street a width of thirty and one-half
feet on each side of the center line of
the street, and from the east line of
High street to the west line of
Church street the space between the
curbs as they are now in place, and
the full intersection of Liberty street
and High street to the proper sub-
grade.

Third—By paving the roadway
and full intersections, save and ex-
cept the space between the rails and
one foot outside of the rails of the
street railway tracks with Warren's
Bitulithic Water Proof Pavement.

Fourth—By paving the space be-
tween the rails of the railway tracks
and one foot outside of the track,
belonging to the Portland General
Electric R. R. Co., and Oregon Elec-
tric R. R. Co., with stones and blocks
set on concrete and grouted with ce-
ment mortar and by replacing the
rails now in use with grooved rails
not less than seven inches in depth
and weighing not less than seventy-
five (75) pounds per yard. The con-
crete under the rails and stone
blocks to be not less than six inches
in depth.

Fifth—By constructing artificial
stone curbs on each side of the street
from the east line of Commercial
street to the center line of High
street, thirty-one and one-half feet
from the center line of the street,
and joining the curb with those now
in place on Liberty street and High
street, and by constructing artificial
stone sidewalks over the space be-
tween the curbs now in place and the
proposed new curb, and on other
portions of the sidewalk area not
now paved with artificial stone side-
walk.

Sixth—By constructing an inlet
for the water at the northeast cor-
ner of the intersection of State street
with High street and a catch basin
at the northwest corner, and con-
necting the inlet and catch basin
with six-inch vitrified sewer pipe,
and connecting the catch basin with
the sewer with six-inch sewer pipe.
