WORKING FOR WATERWAYS.

Governor Chamberlain is working hard to have a large delegation go from Oregon to attend the National Rivers and Harbors Convention.

This gathering of men from every state will meet in Washington, D. C., on the 7th of December, when Congress meets for the short session.

It is expected that a rivers and harbors appropriation bill will pass at the short session of Congress—THE FIRST IN MANY YEARS.

The great waterway convention will demand that at least fifty or sixty millions annually be expended on improving waterways.

The average expenditure for many years has been about nineteen million dollars. Some times improvements have failed because no money was to be had.

The amount spent annually now on the army and navy comes near one

hundred million dollars each, and THE WATERWAYS FOR COMMERCE ARE NEGLECTED.

To this end Oregon should be well represented, and the Portland Chamber of Commerce will send a number of delegates.

Coos Bay Chamber of Commerce has raised \$500 to send delegates. Governor Chamberlain has appointed fifteen delegates at large, and will appoint more if he can find persons who will go.

GREAT CHANGES

Carpenters and Mechanics Invade the Eilers Piano House and Begin to Do Things

Big Improvements Under Way
—Much Space to Be Added
—Fine Business Being Done by the Firm

(Reproduced from the Journal [Portland, Ore.], of Nov. 10.)

Instead of the sound of the piano, the noise of the hammer and saw are the predominating factors at present at the store of the Eilers Piano House, on the busy music corner of Washington and Park streets.

Possession has at last been secured by the firm of the upper floor and the additional space which is to be added to the firm's quarters, and the work of remodeling the building is being rushed forward as fast as possible. The long delay which the house experienced in securing occupancy of the upper floor is a matter of which the public is aware, and has been a subject of deep concern to the Eilers company, who have been at their wit's end to know how to handle the immense business of the past few months.

A reporter who made the rounds of the new quarters yesterday found Mr. S. J. McCormick, the genial vice-president and manager of the firm, busily engaged in directing a dozen things in as many minutes, here, there, and everywhere, but with all his overtaxed time, he took long enough time to show the newspaper man through the maze of pianos, carpenters and general confusion.

Said McCormick: "This is the worst imaginable mess for a music store to go through with, but the battle will be worth the struggle, for when we complete these extensive changes which are now under way, we shall have the finest music house in this part of the country. We shall have in addition to our first and basement floors, a space on the second floor equal to a full quarter block. We shall have a fine broad stairway leading from Park street to our second floor, upon which will be located our main salesroom, embracing 2500 square feet of floor space, our organ department with an additional 1000 square feet, a spacious pianola department, publicity department, and a number of well adapted studios. Our main salesroom will be splendidly lighted and well ventilated, and our pianola department will be the finest of its kind probably on the coast; this room will have sound proof walls, and will be arranged in every particular to best meet the demands of the purposes for which it will be used. There will be convenient elevator service, bringing the second floor within easy access, and this second floor will be removed to a considerable degree from the noise and confusion of the street, which will be much appreciated by those who are engaged especially in the selection of pianos.

"We shall continue to maintain on our first floor, our receiving, shipping, repair and tuning departments, as well as our Phonograph Department, which is growing to unusual proportions.

"Business has been phenomenal during the past few weeks, and is a sign that the city of Portland and the entire north Pacific coast section is in a most prosperous condition—perhaps more so than even in its previous history. We have been sending pianos in carload shipments to our branch houses, with rapidly-increasing frequency, and still the call comes from our outside representatives for 'more pianos.' Our local sales have been especially gratifying too, and everything indicates a wonderful fall and winter trade."

THROUGH FIRE AND QUAKE.

C. H. Hinges Refilling Watch That Stood the San Francisco Disaster.

C. H. Hinges, the jeweler, is engaged in putting new works in a silver hunting case watch that went through the San Francisco fire and earthquake without harm to the massive case.

A San Francisco gentleman who is staying in Salem for the present brought the watch to Mr. Hinges to have new works put in. The watch was left by its owner in a desk in his office on the tenth floor of the Spreckles building and was found in the ruins weeks afterwards and identified by the owners monogram "C. B. H." engraved on the case. The fire had turned the silver black, oxidized it in a manner and the owner asked that it be allowed to retain all the tarnish given it in the memorable fire.

The Coming Battleship.

Washington, Nov. 17.—It would be safe to say that the battleship about to be built by the United States government, as a stand-off to the British monster Dreadnought, will be of 20,000 tons displacement and will be capable of the carriage of ten 12-inch guns. Prominent persons in the navy department favor a vessel with sixteen 5-inch guns, they could be so fitted so as to protect torpedo attack both astern and ahead. It is stated that five designs are being considered. A prominent naval expert has stated: "We shall build a good and strong vessel, one that shall be an honor and a source of protection to our country but till the plan is finally selected shall be submitted to congress very little of its design will be known to the outside world. Japan has commenced the building of two vessels, which will undoubtedly be equal if not superior to the Dreadnought, and we shall have to see the raise of the Japs and go one or two better, or be left out in the cold, as regards naval preparedness."

The construction price must not exceed \$6,000,000.

Nevada to Lead Mining States.

New York, Nov. 17.—Mr. Thomas C. Robinson, well known in Nevada mining circles, has arrived here. He states that owing to the opening of new claims and the introduction of new and improved plant, Nevada, which was now second, only to Colorado, would be far in the lead in a year's time. New mines are being opened up all over the state and the ore bodies are large and carry consistent values that will go up to \$100 a ton.
