Sizing Up the Japanese.

So far as the special case is concerned of the rights of Japanese youths in San Francisco schools, the trouble is in a fair way of adjustment. But while this particular eruption may be healed, the blood condition remains from which future outbreaks may be expected.

In California and Hawaii, where he is best known, the claim is made that the "smiling little brown man" is insolent and disagreeable in the extreme when in a position where those qualities are not likely promptly to react upon himself; that is to say, when he is many instead of few. The basis of the Chinese unpopularity, his refusal to adopt the land of his adoption, seems to exist in the Japanese, despite the oft-remarked imitableness of the latter.

There is a difference, but it is a surface difference. The Japanese quickly takes up with the missionary effort to convert him, accepting the new teachings enthusiastically, and thus assisting himself into position and popularity which the less diplomatic Chinese never attained. He admires America, which few Chinese ever claim to do, and makes great efforts to learn the language. But when he no longer needs his missionaries, they are pained to find him as devout a Buddhist as ever. His admiration for America does not go the length of naturalization. His fealty to Japan is eternal, his apparent fealty to America a tactful means of getting the greatest possible returns out of America.

This is the Pacific coast and the Hawaiian opinion of the Jap. Hawaiian planters are now refusing to employ him. Union labor, in California is preparing to fight him away from the coast. Last year 17,600 of him came to the United States, including Hawaii. He is now working eastward, and has already reached the eastern limit of the Rocky mountain locust invasion. Should he continue as indigestible increment, serious international conditions will arise, for Japan is not China. Says the Jap to himself and to us, "You do not dare to try to exclude us. We are as big as you are."—Nebraska Journal.
