What Is Florence Gear?

Miss Florence Gear, Jules Murry's new star who is appearing in that delightful comedy of morals and manners "The Marriage of Kitty" this season, is the latest "find" of the managerial basket. CITY SOLONS SPEND NIGHT IN BICKERING

Highland and Pine, were referred to the committee.

Alderman Genser proposed an ordinance which was read twice requiring the city marshal to enforce all ordinances and laws and fixing his punishment for failing to do so for the first offense, a public reprimand; for the second offense, suspension and for the third offense expulsion from office. This was then referred to the committee on parks.

Then an ordinance regulating saloons was read and referred to the committee on fire and water.

The proposed ordinance provides that all saloons shall have all curtains and shades removed from the doors and windows of the saloons during closed hours so that a clear and unobstructed view of the interior may be had.

At this juncture, a petition was presented by Rev. W. H. Selleck representing the Ministerial association asking that it be incorporated in the proposed ordinance that all saloons shall close at 11 o'clock p. m. and shall not be opened again until 5 o'clock a. m. This petition was signed by an enormous number of people and the petition was 28 yards long by the yardstick. The petition was referred in connection with the ordinance.

Panama as a New Field for Farmers.

Washington, Nov. 14.—A further report from Consul James C. Kellogg, of Colon, received today drawing attention to Panama as a new field for farmers states that vegetables have to be imported here from Jamaica, New York and New Orleans as those grown in the country do not go near meeting the demand. The country produces valuable hard woods, such as rosewood, mahogany, etc. All kinds of tropical methods of planting, as practiced by the natives, are extremely crude and modern agriculture and machinery are unknown. Mr. Kellogg believes a modern farm situated in the canal zone would become highly profitable while there is a great opening all over the country for American implements and machinery.
