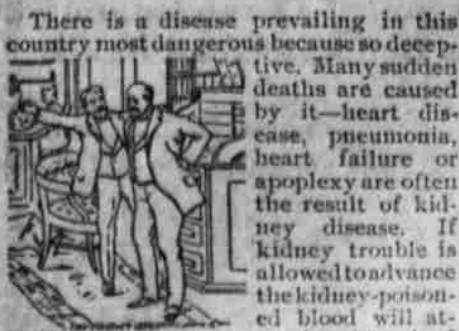

#### Question of Placing the name of Wallace Trill on Ballot is Up to City Attorney.

City Recorder Moores this morning referred the question of whether the name of Wallace Trill should be printed on the official ballot at the approaching municipal election to City Attorney Condit, and requested that official to make a written opinion. Hence he has referred the matter to the city's legal advisor. Mr. Condit said he was busily engaged in other matters this forenoon, and could not take the question up at once, but would endeavor to reach a decision today if possible and submit it to the recorder.

Mr. Moores has never said that he would decline to put Mr. Trill's name on the ballot; neither has he said that he would abide by the decision of the city attorney.

## PASTOR SCORES M'NARY

### Rev. Clarence True Wilson Makes Another Attack on District Attorney.

Rev. Clarence True Wilson, in a sensational sermon in Portland Sunday, blames the Marion county district attorney with the Murray murder in Portland. Some time ago this minister made another attack on Mr. McNary, accusing him of neglect to prosecute a man for selling liquor, when at that time the man was in jail for the offense, and is still there. The Portland papers report Rev. Mr. Wilson as saying:

"This tragedy might have been averted if the district attorney of Marion county had not shown so much more sympathy with the real criminal and libertine than with the heart-broken family which had been wronged. His sitting back in his easy chair, and answering an appeal for help in a delicate emergency by saying: 'We are not running a marriage bureau here' is responsible for the trouble.

"The district attorney's office of Marion county is the worst one in the state—notoriously so. When sworn officers of the law are at heart law-breakers, decent men are puzzled to know whether no law is better than personally administered vengeance."

When the attention of Charles L. McNary was called to this statement this morning, he said:

"If the Portland preacher will put his false and slanderous statements in writing, so that he may be reached by the criminal libel laws of the state, I will give him an opportunity to prove what he says. I hereby challenge him to do this. He very well knows that the criminal libel law of Oregon is so construed that false and malicious statements like this must be made in writing or printed, in order that the responsibility may be fixed. He is afraid to do this, and takes advantage of loopholes in the law to falsely vilify this office."

The home of Wm. Cheever, two miles east of Elkton, was totally destroyed by an explosion of blasting powder Sunday. Unknown to Mr. Cheever his two sons secured the powder from the tunnel on the Coos Bay line near their home, and put it under their bed. While engaged in a friendly scuffle they upset the lamp and scattered kerosene all over the room, igniting the powder, with the above result. Mr. Cheever was blown 50 feet in the air and was badly injured. The other members of the family were buried in the debris, but escaped without serious injury.

### COMPLETE BRIDGE TOMORROW

### Southern Pacific Trains Will Cross Santiam at Jefferson Thursday

The temporary span in the Southern Pacific railroad bridge across the Santiam river at Jefferson will be completed tonight, and it is expected that all trains will cross tomorrow morning.
