Convict Mail Robber Sued. Philadelphia, Nov. 21.—George Mitchell, alias Alfred Henry, now a prisoner in Carson City penitentiary undergoing sentence for mail robbery, has been made the defendant in a civil action brought in the Montgomery county courts to recover a \$10,000 draft which it is alleged, was purchased by forging a draft found amongst the contents of a stolen mail bag. Geo. B. Nixon, United States senator from Nevada; John Cook and Geo. Wingfield, of Goldfield, Neb., are the plaintiffs in this equity suit which will proceed to trial on the day after the ordinary fixing service on defendant was returned today. Later it was learned that it had been given in payment of a lot in Glenside, and they now sue the courts that the property be conveyed over to them. The action is defended.

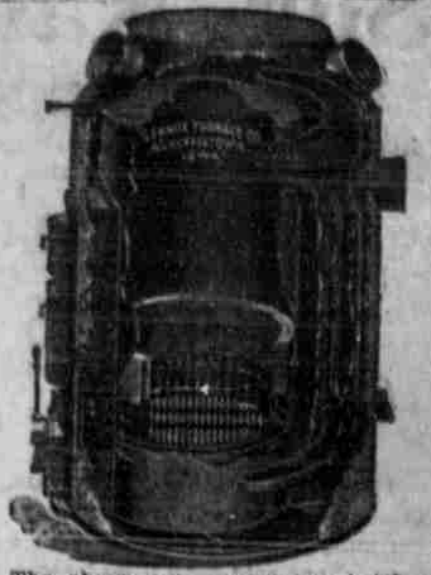
