FARM IN UNION COUNTY

Appropriation Will Be Asked For Eastern Oregon Experiment Station

Former State Senator Walter M. Pearce, of Umatilla county, was in Salem yesterday on business. Mr. Pearce, besides being a lawyer of fine attainments, is a wheat king in Umatilla and Union counties and is the principal owner of the great Eastern Oregon resort at Hot Lake where he is arranging to make of the group of buildings the finest hotel in Oregon.

A part of Mr. Pearce's business here was to work for an appropriation the next legislature will be asked to make for the benefit of the eastern Oregon experimental station.

Appropriated for Asylum.

It will be remembered that a number of years ago, the state appropriated a sum of money to purchase a site for an insane asylum in eastern Oregon and 640 acres were purchased in Union county not far from the town of Union. It is one of the finest farms in the state of this size. The legislature has abandoned the idea of establishing the branch asylum, which is prohibited by the constitution anyway, and since then the farm has been used as an agricultural experiment station.

The state has appropriated considerable money from time to time for this purpose and during the two terms that Mr. Pearce was in the state senate he secured about \$15,000. It was the purpose to keep this intact and most of it now remains in the treasury.

Mr. Pearce and a large number of eastern Oregon farmers believe this farm is a very valuable institution.

It and make a small appropriation for its maintenance.

Governor Unwilling.

Governor Chamberlain will be urged to recommend in his message to the legislature that an appropriation be made. It is doubtful if Governor Chamberlain will do this as he does not believe the practical benefits from the farm justify the appropriation.

Judge Bailey's Plan.

Judge Thomas G. Bailey, of the supreme court, who besides being an able jurist, is a practical farmer of experience, has a plan that he believes to be a good one.

He thinks that a small experiment station should be maintained in each county, probably on the county poor farm, and each one under the direction of the Oregon Agricultural College experiment station. In this way things could be experimented with that suited the particular soil and climate of each county. The counties of Oregon are widely different in their characteristics and farming suited to eastern Oregon is entirely out of place in the Willamette valley.

State Engineer Lewis is interested in all such matters and some statements will no doubt be made to the legislature.

SPEAKING OF CIVIC REFORM

Salem Should Benefit by Example Set by Other Cities Says J. Conner

"Speaking of civic improvement," said Proprietor J. Conner, of the Willamette hotel, during a discussion of the subject with a Journal reporter last evening, "Salem should pattern after the plans adopted by nearly all of the cities of any importance in Colorado and Utah."

"The first essential to cleanliness and tidiness in a city is to get the people in the habit of throwing their refuse where it will not become scattered upon the streets and sidewalks. In other words, carry the idea of 'a place for everything and everything in its place' into the government of municipal affairs."

"There is not a day nor an hour of the day when you cannot walk down the streets of Salem and see the sidewalks and gutters strewn with scrap paper and refuse of all kinds and descriptions and one is in constant danger of painful if not serious injury, and possibly the fracture of bones, by slipping upon the innocent looking banana peel. All this in spite of the fact that there are stringent ordinances on the city statutes absolutely forbidding the throwing of fruit skins, paper scraps or debris of any kind upon the streets or sidewalks."

"In Salt Lake City, Ogden, Denver and all other cities of any prominence in the Rocky mountain district every street corner is provided with a large stationary metal box, made in the shape of a small dog kennel and provided with suitable openings into which all scraps of paper and refuse of all kinds, except cigar and cigarette stumps, are to be cast by the pedestrians. Anyone failing to observe the ordinance prohibiting the throwing of refuse any place except in these boxes will be called to prompt and severe account by the peace officers and, in consequence, the streets and sidewalks are kept scrupulously clean and free from debris."

"These boxes cost the city practically nothing since the outside space upon them is sold to the highest bidder for advertising purposes, and, in case of strong competition in this line, the city makes a handsome profit upon the investment besides obtaining the excellent results sought. If Salem should adopt a system of this kind you would not hear so much complaint and kicking about dirty streets and filthy sidewalks as under present conditions."

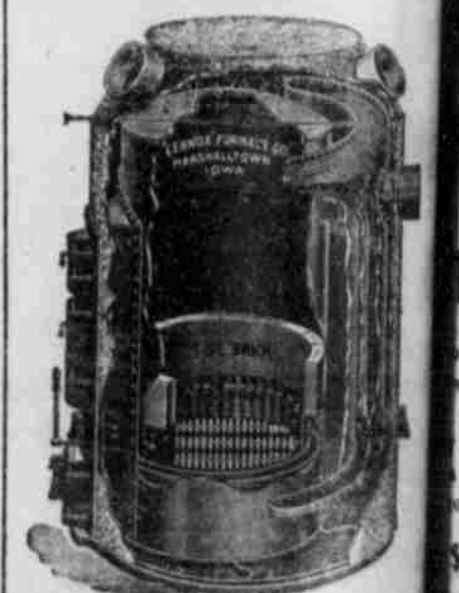
