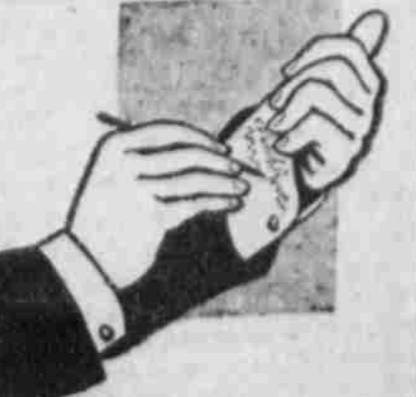

SCHOOLS AT MERCY OF FLAMES

Buildings and Lives of Pupils Without Protection From Fire

"Being without water with which to make a fight what would we do in case fire should break out in any of our school buildings tomorrow?"

This, in substance, is the question brought up by Chairman Byrd of the school board during a discussion of the feasibility of adopting the automatic fire alarm system, now being installed throughout the city by the State Agent Company, for the several school buildings of the city at the meeting of the board Saturday evening.

It developed that not one of the school buildings of the city was equipped with stand pipes to afford a supply of water in case of a conflagration and, should the flames secure headway enough before discovered, not only would the property stand in danger of complete demolition but the lives of scores of school children would also be in jeopardy as a consequence. Local Agent Gamble of the State Agent Company, who is superintending the installation of the thermostat system in this city was present at the meeting and explained just how the little mute instrument would keep an ever watchful eye to guard against just such conditions as Dr. Byrd pointed out, although Director Epley, who is a member of the special committee of the board to investigate into the virtues of the system, reported favorably upon the adoption of it in the city school buildings, it was finally decided to pass the question up for final decision until a later meeting when a fuller attendance of the members could be had and the district in a better financial condition to meet the expense.

The cost of wiring and putting in the alarm system in the East school was placed at \$3, which would include the placing of 116 thermostats in the basement and the several rooms of the buildings and the cost of installing of the same system in the other buildings of the district will be the same in proportion as to size. It was represented by the agent of the company that the placing of the automatic alarms in the school buildings would reduce the cost of insurance to the district at least 25 per cent.

The report of the special committee to investigate the quality of work performed by O. C. Kinnen on the basement floor of the North school building was received and to the effect that the work was in all respects satisfactory and quite up to contract stipulations and the bill of the contractor, amounting to \$609.69 was allowed in full. The original contract price was for \$555 but the extra work performed made up for the balance. The bill of August Bergerger for the amount of work he performed on the basement floor was rejected and this action was final as far as the board is concerned.

The matter of the alleged recalcitrancy or combative disposition on the part of Henry Hoffman, toward the faculty of the North Salem school, which resulted in his arrest on the charge of threatening to kill Professor McCann, was also reported to the board and discussed at some length but it was thought best to let the civil court handle the case insofar as it had been carried to that extreme. Superintendent Powers in discussing the matter said Hoffman should be given a lesson since he had been inside the school building and had used language unbecoming a gentleman and stated that "some of the principals are actually afraid of their lives on his account."

At this Chairman Byrd said he thought the city superintendent, Professor Powers, "could be the proper person to go down there and give the fellow a good thrashing." This suggestion, however, did not seem to meet with the approval of Superintendent Powers, and the incident was dropped for the time being.

Upon motion of Director Epley it was ordered that the floor of Superintendent Powers' private office be laid with linoleum, some shelving put in for the accommodation of his books and that some window shades be provided to place the office in keeping with the balance of the new building and its furnishings and these details were left to the discretion of the committee on repairs.

The resignation of Miss Adella Schindler, as a teacher in the Salem

schools was tendered and accepted to take effect December 27, and the resignation of Hamilt F. Smith, as a member of the board of directors was also received and accepted (Mr. Smith having removed his place of residence from this city to Vancouver, Washington), and the clerk of the board was instructed to notify the county school superintendent of the vacancy, in accordance with the school laws of the state. A successor to Mr. Hamilt will probably not be elected by the board until the next regular meeting.

Clerk Johnson reported a balance of \$417.17 on hand December 1, and, as this will not be sufficient to meet current indebtedness of the district, the clerk and chairman were authorized to borrow enough money to make up the deficiency.

The janitors receive \$10 for that work, with the exception of the East school janitor who receives \$20 and that of the high school whose compensation is determined differently.
