NEW CURE FOR RHEUMATISM.

(From New York Life.)
One of the latest cures for rheumatism is bees. These are applied to the place or places most in need.

Care should be taken before applying the remedy to secure good, active bees. Some bees are naturally timid by nature. They are undersized and have not the courage of their stingers. It must not always be inferred, however, that the size of a bee determines his power. It frequently happens that a small bee will make up in energy and perseverance what he lacks in avoirdupois.

Some bees have naturally kind dispositions. They avoid trouble. It is almost unnecessary to say that these are not the best for our purpose.

With a little experience the patient will be able to tell almost at a glance the most ferocious bees and will learn methods of his own to goad them on to their task. It is well, if possible, to examine them individually, and see that their stingers are in perfect order.

A bee with a weak stinger only does harm, for he interferes with the best work.

It is well to know that bees are methodical in their work, and it is not well to hurry them too much. When you have your swarm ready, place yourself unadorned in an armchair with some good book and let the swarm loose in your room.

It is believed that they will instinctively choose the right place to settle, but in case they do not at first let them try it over again. Poke them up occasionally with a sharp stick. Do not dose off while they are ap-

plying the cure. The mental part is essential. The patient's attention should be fixed on himself, even if it required some effort of the mind. If you see no immediate improvement, don't be discouraged. Get new bees from time to time and keep it up.

LETTER TO SCHOOL CHILDREN.

Green River, Wyo., Dec. 2.
The second day out on the trip across the continent found us at Pocatello, Idaho, and at night we were well into Wyoming. After leaving Oregon we follow up the Snake river south about 50 miles, once more crossing back into Oregon for about 10 miles. The Snake river valley has some large orchard districts. At Weiser, Idaho, all the boys who were not skating on the river were selling apples at the train. The governor bought some and treated all the delegates. Most of the railroad stations have tight, high board fences to keep people from raiding the coal cars. At some places the fuel famine is so bad wood is \$50 a cord, and it requires two men on each car to guard the coal. We say many coyotes, but Jack rabbits.

We have not been out of sight of snow since leaving Pendleton. There are no stock barns through all this grazing region. Immense herds of horses and cattle—mostly the latter—graze on the ranges. There is some grain grown. There are streams of water in the ditches and natural streams in all the valleys. There are many stacks of wild hay and alfalfa. In summer the stock is kept off the meadows and ranges in the hills. At this season hay is hauled in wagon loads and scattered on the snow for them. All the men wear heavy overcoats; horses and cattle have heavy coats of hair; nearly everybody wears muffler scarfs and ear protectors. One sees almost no women or girls on the streets. At one place I saw three, the only women I saw in Idaho. One of them chewed gum and said she was "fine and dandy."

For hundreds of miles our train follows big, open, treeless valleys, with foothills on each side and mountain ranges in the distance. Wherever there is a water ditch there is a fringe of willows. On the crests of hills one sees growths of dark, pine forest. The landscape is unbroken, except by haystacks and one-story houses. These are often log, with a foot of gravel for a roof. The towns are nearly all one-story houses, except the public schools, which are sometimes two story. You always see one house without any windows in it, which the porter said was a jail. The largest signs are on the saloons. The churches are few and small. Still, taken as a whole, with railroad and telegraph, with fine wagon roads and telephones everywhere the great inter-mountain stock regions are highly civilized, compared to the times when Washington Irving's hero, "Bonneville," in the book by that name crossed the plains with Astor's fur company expedition.
