Letter to School Children.

Chicago, Dec. 5, 1906.

Governor Chamberlain and his party arrived in this city nearly a day late. The train got in at 8:50 p. m., and they all went to the Auditorium hotel. The governor had worked on his speech all the way out from Portland and was ready to retire. The rest of the party set out to see the city. Dr. Ray led the way about the great brilliantly lighted city. Mrs. Ray being in the party, we went first to see the great dry goods and department stores. We saw the wonderful new court house that is being built, to cost eleven millions. One store had a doll display with 100,000 dolls of all sizes. Hundreds of happy doll couples were waiting. Some cute little baby dolls were dancing about in their nightgowns. Others were boxing and some were roller skating.

There has been a great convention in Chicago for several days discussing truancy in public schools. Chicago has a compulsory education law. Parents are fined who do not keep their children in school up to a certain age. Chicago has 5000 truant officers. Boys just above the truant age are very troublesome. There are not as many children out of school in Chicago as in Oregon. I must tell you of a collision I was in. It was on a suburban train coming into Chicago from Longwood, where my mother lives. There was a fog and we bumped head first into a locomotive. No one was hurt. From Omaha to Chicago our train part of the way ran 65 to 75 miles per hour—so fast one could not sleep in the Pullman sleeping car. From Chicago to Washington we go about 1000 miles in 20 hours. Counting stops, that is over fifty miles an hour.
