## SIMPLY PLAIN LIARS

### Railroads Create Conditions and Can Change Them at Any Time

Three more responses have come  
to the Interstate commerce commis-  
sion from northwestern railroads in  
response to Chairman Knapp's tele-  
gram of last week calling attention  
to the reported shortage in cars and  
the complaints of a lack of trans-  
portation for the necessities of life  
and of fuel, says a dispatch from  
Washington of last Monday. It then  
proceeds to say:

Telegrams were sent by the chair-  
man to the presidents of six of the  
great western and northwestern  
roads, and replies have now been re-  
ceived from all of them.

From the information conveyed by  
the railroad companies today the  
commissioners express the opinion  
that one cause for the shortage in  
fuel is that the dealers have not  
stored up in advance sufficient quan-  
tities for the winter's supply, but  
have, as stated in the reply by Presi-  
dent James J. Hill of the Great  
Northern, ordered only a sufficient  
supply to last from day to day.  
Whatever shortage may exist in car  
equipment, they say, is aggravated  
by lack of motive power, inadequate  
terminal facilities and insufficient  
trackage property to move the great  
volume of business pouring in on the  
railroads, supplemented by the de-  
lays on the part of shippers in load-  
ing and unloading their cars.

Replies were made public today  
from President Hill of the Great  
Northern, President A. J. Earling of  
the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul,  
and President Howard Elliott of  
the Northern Pacific companies.  
Following is the message from Hill:

"Replying to your message, re-  
peated from St. Paul to New York,  
am on my way to St. Paul to meet  
commissioners tomorrow. The coal  
scarcity in North Dakota is not due  
to want of cars. Thousands of em-  
pty cars have been moving from the  
head of Lake Superior to the grain  
fields during the fall, and coal or-  
dered by local dealers has been only  
sufficient to supply them from day  
to day. During the last two weeks  
there have been very heavy snow-  
storms, with the thermometer below  
zero. Snow drifts around stations  
from six to fifteen feet deep have  
temporarily blocked railroads. Spe-  
cial trains of coal, having right of  
way over all other traffic, are being  
sent, and the road is opened as fast  
as conditions will allow. The fuel

difficulty is temporary and is being  
rapidly remedied.

"The general condition applying  
to all traffic is due to the rapid in-  
crease in tonnage to be moved. Owing  
to difficulties in disposing of  
freight at terminals the average car  
movement varies from fifteen to  
thirty miles a day. Our increase in  
locomotives and cars since last  
spring is from 15 to 17 per cent in  
number and more than that in ca-  
pacity, which, with reasonable op-  
portunity to move, would amply care  
for the traffic. Inability to secure  
labor at any price has badly delayed  
the congestion of additional main  
tracks and terminals. We have or-  
ders for new locomotives to be de-  
livered between now and June 1st  
for 25 per cent in capacity, and 6000  
freight cars to be delivered between  
January and September; capacity of  
the latter, 280,000 pounds. How-  
ever, permanent relief can only come  
through increase of double track and  
terminal facilities of double track  
and terminal facilities. We are now  
arranging for \$50,000,000 covering  
the next two years to provide addi-  
tional tracks, terminals, equipment  
and new lines when traffic is heav-  
ily increased.—JAMES J. HILL."

President Howard Elliott of the  
Northern Pacific Railway company  
telegraphs the commission from St.  
Paul as follows:

"There is a scarcity of fuel in  
some parts of the country served by  
our line, but we do not know of any  
shortage of other necessities of life.  
Our company has done and will con-  
tinue to do all that it can to prevent  
suffering. The company realized in  
June and July last that the fuel sup-  
ply was likely to be inadequate and  
that the great increase in general  
business would probably produce a  
congestion in the autumn. We there-  
fore urged all dealers at that time  
to look ahead and provide a stock of  
coal early and to try to find new  
sources of supply. I think the reason  
given in your message, namely,  
extraordinary delays in moving, is  
incorrect so far as this company is  
concerned. The difficulty in Mont-  
ana, Idaho and Washington is that  
not enough coal is being produced to  
supply promptly the increased do-  
mestic trade and at the same time  
furnish the railroad with fuel for  
the operation of its trains. Then, in  
November, unprecedented floods west  
of the Cascades mountains damaged  
our tracks so that trains could not  
move over important part of the  
road for more than a week and a  
number of important coal mines  
could not be reached."
