## ENGLISH WOMAN SORE

## Don't Like the Way White House Reception is Managed

Washington, ec. 26.—It is not believed here that Lady Susan Townley had anything to do with the recall of Ambassador Durand, Great Britain's representative in the United States, but the gossip linking her name with the recall of the ambassador has brought out a perfect flood of stories about that remarkable and interesting member of the British peerage.

Lady Townley, who is a daughter of the Earl of Albemarle, was here with her husband until last May, when he retired as counselor to the British embassy. She is of striking beauty and is recognized as the most modish and best gowned woman in the diplomatic corps. Add to this the fact that she wielded a facile although sarcastic pen, was a wit who never considered the feelings of others, and did not hesitate to speak her mind, and you have a remarkable character.

She had a healthy contempt for many people in public life in Washington and not the least of these were President Roosevelt and the Durands.

Oddly enough, her two closest intimates were Mrs. Herbert Parsons, made famous by her trial marriage propaganda, and Maxine Elliott. When Maxine Elliott played in Washington Lady Townley attended almost every performance, and gave numerous box parties. She also entertained the actress several times. She is quoted as having said to one senator's wife:

"My goodness, I would not go to the White House if you gave it to me. A reception there is the biggest circus in America."

Concerning Roosevelt she said: "Washington society is a bear garden and 'Roosey' is a performing bear."

"There is no need for court et-

quette at the White House," she remarked at another time. "The mandate that you must not speak to the king unless first addressed by him would be obsolete here, as one could not get in a word edgewise with the President if one tried. He does all the talking."

A few fell stumbling over the chairs in groping from the hall in the lacy blackness of the night, but all quit the building. The faithful remained until a late hour, and practiced the rites with great relish.

Regarding the unknown writing, Mr. Ryan said he could already read

some of it, and expected soon to be given power to read it all. Solkeld the cracker-jack star interpreter, said that when he spoke in unknown tongues he did so intuitively, and that the Lord immediately put the translation in his mouth, and that he rendered the English version involuntarily, and that if he were asked to select a single word of the gibberish and give its English equivalent he could not do so; but he can, with the help of the Holy Spirit, give the entire work at once. This explanation seemed to be entirely satisfactory to the faithful.
