Wallowa Lands Withdrawn.

Washington, Dec. 28.—Assistant Commissioner Pollock, of the general and office, today notified land officers in the territories directly interested that 718,760 acres in the north-eastern section of Oregon, located in Wallowa and Union counties, in that state, adjoining the Chesnimus and Wallowa forest reserves, had been withdrawn from any disposition whatsoever, in order to add to the reserve above mentioned.

Also that for forest reserve purposes 600,000 acres in Idaho and Wyoming, of which 593,000 are situated in the southeastern part of Idaho, in Bligham and Banner counties, has been withdrawn from entry. The 7000 acres lying in Wyoming are located in Uintah county, his reserve includes the Plews and arbores ranges of mountains.

Washington, Dec. 28.—(Special.)—If a bill introduced this week by Senator Burkett becomes law, the United States mails will be open for the free transportation of all reading matter for the use of the blind. The Nebraska senator's measure is as poetical as a senate bill can be made. It touches tenderly upon the inability of the blind to see the works of nature and of art, and dwells sympathetically upon the many hours they are obliged to spend in idleness and in darkness. The bill offers as a reason for this giving free carriage through the mails to reading matter for the blind that the cost of embossed matter is many times the cost of ink-printed or written manuscript, that they are heavier and require a greater outlay for postage when mailed, and for this reason the blind,

ARRESTED FOR LIBEL.

R. S. Sheridan, of Boise, Accused of Slandering Governor Gooding, of Idaho.

R. S. Sheridan, formerly of Oregon, principal owner of the Boise Capital News, has been arrested, charged with criminal libel, on complaint of Governor Gooding, of Idaho, who feels aggrieved at the following statement, printed in Mr. Sheridan's paper six months ago:

CONTEND GOVERNOR HAS POWER

"Chick" Houghton Habeas Corpus Proceedings Being Heard Today.

The hearing of the writ of habeas corpus proceedings to secure the release of Charles "Chick" Houghton from the penitentiary is in progress before Judge Burnett of the circuit court this afternoon.

The writ was sued out by Attorney M. J. McMahan of Portland on behalf of Houghton demanding the release of the prisoner on the ground that the governor has no authority to grant a conditional pardon or commutation of sentence to convicts.

Governor Chamberlain and Superintendent James, who are represented by Attorney General Crawford set forth the contention, in substance, that the governor has authority, under section 1572, of the statutes, to pardon convicts upon such conditions

as are not construed illegal. Section 1572 of the code provides as follows:

"The governor has power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after convictions, for all crimes; and to remit, after judgment therefor, all penalties and forfeitures, upon such conditions and with such restrictions and limitations as he may think proper, subject to the regulations provided in this chapter."
