Asks Damage.

Basil H. Wagner this morning commenced an action in department 2 of the Marion county circuit court against the Western Union Telegraph company asking judgment against the said defendant for the sum of \$454.

The complaint states that on or about the 28th day of May, 1906, the plaintiff applied for a position in the store of B. M. Behrunds & Co., of Juneau, Alaska. The plaintiff states that the said firm through Fred Williams accepted the proposition of the plaintiff and agreed to employ him for the period of one year at a salary of \$100 per month. The petition states that a message to that effect was delivered to the Western Union Telegraph company and was duly received at the said company's office in Salem, but through gross negligence failed and neglected to deliver the message and wired back to the office in Juneau that Wagner was in South Dakota.

The plaintiff therefore asks for \$450 damages and \$4 for the messages which were sent and paid for by his friend Williams. Attorney Bigger appears in the case for the plaintiff.

Indiana Journal's Corn Show.
