A GREAT PROBATE CASE WON

After Being Remanded By the Supreme Court

Inman, Turner and Veazie for plaintiffs won a hard-contested probate case in the circuit court this morning. Froeblich et al. vs. D. F. Lane, administrator of the Froeblich estate, tried before Judge Boise, was reversed and remanded for new trial. The suit was to set aside the final accounting in the county court, on ground of fraud in the publication of the notice, and fraud in the final account. The notice was published in the Salem Sentinel and was held clearly and constructively fraudulent. It was also alleged that there was a contract for attorney fees, which was allowed as to item of \$300, but a new accounting was ordered as to the other items contended for. This suit has been very stubbornly contested and the lawyers who have won out are naturally elated over their victory and not without some cause. It shows that any case in probate can be attacked and overthrown after final accounting has been had, but it takes hard work to do it. Attorney F. A. Holmes, for the defendant, states that an appeal will be perfected at once.
